When you're done working overseas, be sure to ask for a letter of suggestion to testify that you are working abroad, and to share with potential future employers. The challenge to Consider While there are various benefits to foreign studies, consider some downsides before you decide whether it's right for you: Homesickness Can Happen Frequently. If you've never spent much time away from home, this could be a serious issue. You may find yourself years for the people you leave back home, and less of your exit, the more problems this could be. Academic Programmes Abroad May Be Less Stringent. Of course, this comes down to where you are studying and the program in question. Ask other students who have participated in the program, you are keen to see if it will be worth it from an academic point of view. It May Be Difficult to Get to know the Locals. In some countries, locals will be warm and inviting, while in others, it may take some to befriend. If you are worried, know in advance how Americans are usually accepted and treated in the area. You may experience cultural shock - when you go home. Once you get used to a foreign environment, your home may actually look alien to you. This effect will be most pronounced when returning from countries cultural differences from your home a lot. Programs Can Be Expensive. Although there are scholarship opportunities overseas designed specifically for students who wish to study abroad, you may not be eligible. Is it worth grabbing more student loan debt? If you are not eligible for a scholarship, weigh the pros and cons to make the best decisions, and be sure to expand your search – consult a state-sponsored initiative for further grants, if possible. Credits Cannot Be Transferred. If you plan to conduct research overseas, be sure to mention it to your college or university, as you may be able to transfer credit to your home institution. However, credit may not always be transferred. This may not be important for some students, but to others it can be important – especially when you consider financial costs. Should You Study Abroad? For those who have not travelled extensively, studying abroad may be an ideal opportunity to find adventures with established program support networks. Students who want to learn a foreign language – or develop existing foreign language skills - and immerse themselves in a new culture will also find it beneficial. Furthermore, students who consider a career in international relations will definitely need to study abroad, as it can increase employment prospects upon graduation. On the other hand, however, studying abroad is less suitable for students with strong attachments to their hometowns and cautioning away apart from family and friends. Some universities also have strict requirements, restricting overseas study programs to students who meet the minimum GPA. Lastly, it is important that students who cannot afford to go abroad do not take additional debt. The desire to travel abroad may be great, but it is better to wait until you have a financial way to do so. You can stick to cheap international tourist destinations, or maybe someday become an ESL teacher abroad. Final Word As a student, you may be young and somewhat unataviable. When considering costs against benefits, consider whether you will have the same opportunity to travel abroad in the future. Chances are that now is the right time to go. However, despite the many reasons for considering studying abroad, keep in mind possible challenges and expenses, and carefully weigh your options before making a final decision.
