CareSource also covers many commonly used OTC drugs with a doctor's written prescription. CareSource uses recommended drug lists, also called PDL. These are the medicines that we want our service providers to prescribe. These lists show the most common, but not all, drugs that are covered by our plans. Changes to the PDL are also recorded quarterly. Primary drug lists To see the primary drug list for your plan, select your state from the list above and click the GO button. Changes to PDL Find My Prescriptions Do you want to find your medicine and find out if it is covered by CareSource? It's easy when you use our Find My Recipe tool. This tool will help you learn how to find the drug. Prior authorisation For some medicines, we may also require your doctor to send us some information. This is called a prior authorisation request. It tells us why a particular drug and/or a certain amount of the drug is needed. We have to accept the request before you get the medicine. Here are some reasons for prior authorisation may be necessary: There is a generic or pharmacy alternative drug available. The drug can be misused. There are other drugs that should be tried first. Some medicines require additional information from your service provider. CareSource will review and issue a decision within 24 hours of the pharmacy's prior authorisation request from the original receipt. In an emergency, a 72-hour bypass medicine can be used to obtain your medication. Requests for prior authorisation of a medicinal product may not be accepted. If it is not approved, we will send you information on how you can appeal our decision and your right to a government consultation. You can ask for a drug that is not on our preferred list of medicines. This is called requesting an exception. If you want to request an exception, fill out the exception form and submit it. Select a state from the list above and click the GO button to retrieve the link to this form. When you're done, click Submit Request. Our pharmacy department will examine your request and provide you with a response within 72 hours Generic Substitution A pharmacy will provide a generic drug if available under the brand name of the drug. This is called general substitution. Members and healthcare providers can expect a generic drug to produce the same effect and be on the same safety profile as the brand-name drug. If a product name product is requested when the general response available, you must request prior authorisation for prior authorisation Switching Sometimes you may have a drug allergy or intolerance, or a particular drug may not be effective. A health care provider may request a drug that is not in the PDL. This is called therapeutic exchange. The service provider must send the authorisation request in advance. Step therapy Sometimes a member has to try the drug in PDL, before CareSource approves a drug that is not in the PDL. This is called step therapy. Certain drugs are covered only if phase therapy is used. Quantity restrictions Some medicines have limitations on how much a member can be given at once. The quantity limits are based on dose densities recommended by drug manufacturers. Patient safety must also be taken into account. Drug safety reminds me Sometimes, the federal government gives the drugs back. If you want to know if the drug you took will be recalled, check the listings with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. If you need a faster connection or access to such services and are not eligible for eduroam, you need someone to sponsor your access. When people refer to cannabis, they traditionally think of the flower or buds of marijuana as the only form of swallowing. In the past, smoking marijuana was the most popular delivery method for most cannabis users. However, Ohio medical marijuana laws (Ohio HB 523) state that the flower shape and concentrated oils cannot be burned and rather vaporised. Fortunately, as scientists around the world begin to further study medical marijuana and its active compounds, THC and CBD, they have gathered a more intimate understanding of the cannabis plant. As a result, new and exciting advances in technology, products and delivery methods have evolved. Ohio State qualified medical marijuana patients have access to a variety of these different THC and CBD products, as well as a traditional dry herb or cannabis flower. Below is a breakdown of all medical marijuana consumption methods, including flower, concentrated oils, edibles and consumables, tinctures and current options. The first form of product that most patients know is the flower of the cannabis plant. In its flower shape, the THC content of the Tier-1 flower is up to 23%, while the Tier-2 flower can vary by 23% from THC to 35%. The flower in Ohio is sold in the so-called Ohio Tenth, or 2.83-gram units. The price of the Ohio Tenth is varied from \$18 to \$60, depending on the level of strain and the dispensing stock at which it is sold. New, larger quantities are coming in packs of 5.66 grams (0.2 ounces), packs of 8.49 g (0.3 ounces), packs of 11.32 g (0.4 ounces), 14.15 g (0.5 ounces) and one ounce (28.35 g). It is important to note that the flower shape and concentrated oils cannot be burned and rather vaporised. As noted earlier, smoking marijuana is strictly prohibited under ohio's medical marijuana law. However, buds are still available for purchase for vaporisation at all dispensers across ohio state. While many patients may be disappointed to learn this, vaporisers are actually known to offer multiple health benefits instead of inhaling marijuana smoke. Although the marijuana plant is an incredible drug, burning it is less than desirable than any type of smoke contains gases and particles that can cause lung irritation and breathing difficulties. And relative to the smell, vaporisers typically have very little smell compared to the strong smell of marijuana smoke. Basically, a vaporiser is a device with a built-in heating component that cooks THC and CBD from flower or oil without burning plant material. A useful analogy is to think of a vaporiser like an oven: the heating component of the evaporator acts as an oven and bakes the drug, creating a vapour (instead of smoke), which is then inhaled. So instead of inhaling burnt plant material and other harmful smoke byproducts, you only get the drug (cannabinoids & terpenes) that you need to feel instant relief! Oil is a very concentrated THC product – often more than 2 times more potent than flower shapes (70% THC per serving compared to ohio's maximum limit of 35% THC for flower). Oils and wax often look like honey or amber, with a sticky, glassy consistency. The oils are loaded into the vaporiser chamber and heated by a method sometimes called hobby. Some vaporisers have the ability to vaporize both flower and concentrated oils. However, there are some devices that are especially used for flower or oils. The oils can also be packed in an additional pill form, which must be swallowed as if taking any pill. These capsules are filled with either THC, CBD or a combination. The additional capsules were the latest cannabis product to hit the Ohio market. Currently, ohio dispensers contain 590 mg (THC) of oil syringes designed only for vaporisation. The oil currently available is fully activated, made only from cannabis-derived terpene, and comes as indica and sativa alternatives in 1 ml syringes. In addition, concentrated wax products are available at distribution points in Ohio. These products range in composition from CO2 extracted bud, crumble, terp sauce and live resin to fresh frozen live resin, solvent dimensions such as Bubble Hash Live Rosin. In addition, central trtrate cartridges are available at distribution points in Ohio! These are basically an all-in-one vaporiser product that allows you to take bets on the battery that comes with the cartridge. In recent years, the popularity of cartridges has exploded due to the efficiency of the product, in addition to comfort and discreetly. Oils and waxes can be used through a vaporiser if it has gasket oil properties, or you can also use an oil rig and vaporize the oil into titanium or quartz pens. If the idea of a plate feels alien and unpleasant, there are devices known as Puffco Peak, which is a vaporiser specially designed for concentrates - a much easier hobby process for those who know less about this form of cannabis. More info on cannabis products, click here. There are also a few different consumables available at Ohio dispensers infused with THC or CBD. In Ohio, edibles are usually packaged at 110 mg in power. Grow Ohio was the first Ohio processor to introduce edible gums, which were the only edible shapes for a couple of months. Since then, several products have come on the market: Buckeye Relief has introduced milk & dark chocolate edibles, Wellspring Fields has introduced soft candy and peppermints, and One Orijin has introduced edible oils. It is important to note that the effects of edible products can last up to an hour or sometimes longer. Most consumer products can last up to 4-6 hours, and can be quite strong or overwhelming if you're new to higher levels of THC, so make sure you share your edibles accordingly! In addition, when consuming an edible form of THC, THC's traditional chemical makeup (delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol) is converted to 11-hydroxy-THC. This can make the edible up to 4 times stronger than traditional forms of medical marijuana consumption, so be sure to start small and slow with portions. Tinctures contain a stronger form of THC or CBD and are often made by infusing these compounds into high-quality alcohol, but Ohio refiners such as Grow Ohio have opted for the CO2 extraction method for their tinctures in Ohio. Tinctures are most often packed in the eye pair. As with any liquid medication, tinctures are used for oral dosing. Drops can be placed under the tongue sublingually or directly in the mouth. Patients can also use this method to add food with THC, CBD or both compounds. This method is often used for those who suffer from debilitating seizures due to minor or mild side effects. Tinctures work faster than most edibles, making it an ideal delivery method for those who don't want to wait for their relief. Tinctures are an ideal option for patients seeking long-term relief while allowing more dosage control. While edible doses are likely to provide longer and more significant relief, many patients find it difficult to identify a consistent dose. Tinctures are the perfect option in these situations, since the DRIP allows you to monitor and control your dose consistently up to a milligram. Ohio has also approved THC and CBD-infused creams, creams and creams for topical dosing. Topical treatments are often used to facilitate certain areas of the body. For example, cancer patients may use topical creams on their hands or feet to reduce vision from chemotherapy treatments. These delivery methods are absorbed through the skin, allowing patients to apply THC or CBD products directly to the affected area. Patients usually begin to feel relieved with current treatments within about an hour of the application. The first topical product to become available in ohio's medical marijuana program was a partnership with Standard Wellness and Manna, which produced shaped transdermal patches. The patches are designed to be placed in the body, with cannabinoids absorbed through the skin into the bloodstream to spread throughout the body, providing about 12 hours of relief. Most recently, Standard Wellness and Wellspring Fields have both brought topical sages that can be used just like loles. Since all these different forms are available to medical marijuana patients, there should be no difficulty in finding the most effective product and mode of delivery that works best with your preferences, circumstances and lifestyles.
