

Brite is available for purchase TODAY! 1. Matthew 3 - Night of Wisdom. Great group lesson: where did the wise come from? How many were there? What gifts did you bring to the child Christ? What to do: Challenge the clubbers to bring a fact of curiosity and then give the clubbers the opportunity to share their wisdom with each other. (Depending on your group, you may want leaders to check for something inappropriate before clubbers share their facts with the group.) 2. Mark 1:16-24 - Fish Night. Great group lesson: Talk about the meaning of following Jesus. What to do: You can bring golden fish cookies for a treat and also for a game prop. Clubbers have to balance various biscuits on a spoon while walking around the circle, etc. You can also have clubbers throw balls into the nets. Or make fishing rods with magnets on the tip for clubbers to catch paper fish (with magnets glued to the back). 3. Luke 10:25-37 - Night of Affliction. Great group lesson: The Good Samaritan. What Clubbers come dressed in bandages. Clubbers come dressed in bandages. Clubbers could make the three-legged run or tie a bow with one hand. 4. John 6:1-15 - Much Night of Food. Great Group Lesson: Talk about feeding the crowd of boy's lunch. Emphasize that children can make a difference to God. What to do: Clubbers could bring food to a food bank. The games can be a team member handing out a crouton to everyone on the team and then collecting them again before running around the circle and into the pin. Or, a clubber must fill a basket with various objects and carry the basket around the circle. And because it's a lot of food night – you should have a snack! 5. Acts 13:1-14:7 - Missionary Night. Great group lesson: Talk about Paul and Barnabas being the first missionaries. Bring a map and follow their route. Or have a missionary teach the lesson. What to do: What do missionaries need? A map, a suitcase, food cans, etc.? Give each team an equal amount of supplies. At the whistle, the first player loads a source around the circle and then hands it to the second player who must load the first supply and add the second and so on. The first team to get all the supplies around the circle (or world?) wins. 6. Romans 12:1-2 - Roman Night. Great group lesson: Talk about what Paul meant when he said we should be living sacrifices. What does that mean for a child? What to do: Bring four old sheets and give one to each team. When the whistle blows, clubber on the line should wrap up in the leaf – like a toga – and then walk around the circle. Or, plan a service project for all clubs – make a trade for the closed, raise money for a missionary, write notes for missionary children living in another country, etc. 7. 1 Corinthians 13 - Night of Love. Great group lesson: This chapter is one of the best known in the entire Bible. How can we show God's love to others? Are we kind, patient, humble? Talk about each of the features with your clubbers. What to do: Interpret different situations common to a child's life. What is the loving way of dealing with the situation, what is the cruel way to deal with the situation? You could have older clubbers write situations that they would like to see as part of a role-play. You could allow them to do it anonymously. Maybe that would give them the opportunity to figure out how to deal with something at home or at school. 8. 1 Corinthians 8 - Night of Generosity. Great group lesson: Here Paul talks about the generosity of the churches in Macedonia, although they were hurting and experiencing severe poverty. (Bible scholars believe that these churches were under great persecution for their belief in Christ.) What to do: Ask clubbers to bring clean underwear packages to a children's shelter (shelters often receive toy clothes, but not underwear items). Or, have clubbers experimental-sized toothpaste, shampoo etc., for a homeless shelter. Think of something other than canned for this event. 9. Galatians 5:22-25 - Fruit of the Night of the Spirit. Great Group Class: Speak the different characteristics of Christian life, as evidenced by the Fruit of the Spirit. What to do: Play with fruits. Bowl with apples (and of course the apples probably don't go straight). Use bananas as batons. Enjoy a snack made with fruit. 10. Ephesians 6:1-2 - Night of Obedience. Great group lesson: These are familiar verses even for many young children, however, obedience goes beyond simply doing what is said. Talk about the need to have a good attitude when obeying. Use examples like this: Mom says you clean your room. You go down the hall, but you kick your little brother's block tower, slam the door and think badly about your mother while you work. Do you think that's what God meant when He said we were going to obey and honor our parents? What to do: a clubber is blindfolded. Another clubber should guide you through an obstacle course telling you what to do don't guide you physically.) Simon Says is another good obedience game. Game.

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
