He is nicknamed Red after appearing as the first Red Ryder in the highly successful 1940 film Adventures of Red Ryder with Noah Beery Sr.; [1] The character was played in later films by Wild Bill Elliott and Allan Lane. After Red Ryder went to bigger budget movies, barry went to bigger budget movies, but no one reached his previous level of success. He played red Doyle in the 1964 Perry Mason episode 'The Case of the Simple Simon'. Barry was born in Houston, Texas. [1] He attended allen Academy.[2] and the Texas School of Mine. [3] Before acting, Barry was a high school and college football player. He went to Los Angeles, California, to work in advertising. [4] Career stage Barry's initial venture in acting was in a production of Tobacco Road on stage in New York in the late 1930s. [5] Acting Barry first entered films as extra and in small roles. He was discovered by John Wayne during a soccer match with Wayne providing Barry introductions to producers. [6] He appeared in a variety of roles before finding his forts and nickname Rooi in the Republic Photos series The Adventures of Red Ryder (1940). Although Barry was short and stockied rather than the lean and hero of the Red Ryder comic, the studio Herbert J. Yates demanded Barry play the role. Yates thought Barry's appearance similar to James Cagney with Barry unsuccessfully asked Yates to throw him into gangster films. Barry continued with Western roles and made two war movies Remember Pearl Harbor (1942) for Republic, as well as leaning from 20th Century Fox for The Purple Heart (1944). He continued to make Western for Republic and other studios. By the 1950s, Barry was a supporting actor instead of playing reins in the Western western team.
