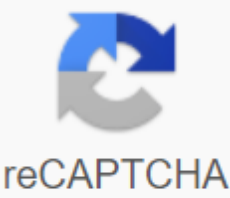




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Map of placer high school

For a specific grade level, all English scores are listed in sequence and a percentage percentage is calculated for each score based on its position in the list. (above a&b) math and English percent percentage slices are weighted according to the number of students who complete each test to create a combined Math+English weighted percentith average for each school. Combined Math+English weighted percentage slices, specific school type is put on a sequen row list and Calculated. How percentage increases work: A percentage of schools is between 0 and 100, reflecting the percentage of schools of the same type (elementary/middle school/K-12), an equal or lower combined Math+English weighted percentith slice (up from 1-c) in California. For example, a 70 percent school would have a combined weighted percentage match equal to or better than 70% of other schools of the same type. CsR Ranking is determined by the percentage rating of a school compared to other schools of the same type in California (above 1-d). (1 is the worst, 10 is the best). Schools of 90 percent and above have 10, 80%-89.999% 9% and so on. A similar number of schools occupy every rank. * This ranking is derived from 2016 California Student Performance and Progress Assessment (CAASPP) data.
