The rule of thumb is to give the final copy officiant three weeks before the wedding. Some officiants may not insist that you send them your vows, but at least you need them ready before the busy weeks before your wedding. Feel free to change, but not too much. Knowing when things start and ends will help the details come together more smoothly, and also give you more control over your guest experience as they move from one room to another. While you can determine exactly how long each can have cocktails, or choose which time you have your first dance, determining how long your ceremony will be the biggest challenge. With so many details coming together, from meaningful readings and songs to your vows and ring exchange, there are many factors to consider. How long is your wedding ceremony supposed to last? Here's what our experts have to say. Wedding ceremonies usually last between 20 and 30 minutes, which is enough time to cover the basics (greetings, some readings, your vows, ring exchange, and final pronunciation). The exact length of your wedding ceremony depends primarily on how many different elements you choose to add, as well as if you have a religious or secular ceremony. Most religious ceremonies follow the same pattern every time, so for example, you see the same elements in most Jewish weddings where you attend. However, you have little control over whether your ceremony is longer or shorter. You can add additional readings to religious text, invite a friend or family member to do a blessing, or add another song that will make your ceremony longer. To do this, more Orthodox ceremonies tend to be longer than those that are a little relaxed. An experienced religious wedding officiant should be able to estimate how long your ceremony will last, based on the elements you want to add. You want to shorten your religious ceremony? Work with your officiant to see what readings can be more-the-point, as well as if there are elements you might want to skip. For a secular ceremony, you have a lot more control over how long your ceremony will be. The only real requirement is that each of you agrees to marry another and that you will be found guilty of being married, so that the rest may be as drawn or short as you want. Using fewer readings is the procedure to go along faster, while a comprehensive story about your relationship or your officiant's musings of marriage can add a few extra minutes to the timeline. No matter how long your ceremony is, if you write your own, make sure that the time to read it out loud (because you read more slowly aloud than you own from start to finish, then add a few minutes in case happy tears leave words caught in someone's throat. You should also work with your planner to assess how long the processional takes, given how many people are walking down the aisle and about how long the altar is. This will help you come up with an assessment of your entire ceremony, so you can both choose a good start time and let your venue and caterers know when the cocktail hour begins. Start.

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
