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## Hyatt place las vegas reviews

Traffic in Las Vegas is plentiful. Use the following tips to help you get around this rollicking city. From Airport Located at the southern end of The Strip, McCarran International Airport is an ultramodern facility that even provides slot and video poker machines. But don't expect to hear the satisfying rumbling of coins when they fall off the winning machine. The airport has paperless slots in which you put your money at the checkout and she gives you paper that quietly slips into the machine. Advertising Car Rental: At McCarran Airport, the main rental companies have stalls located in the baggage claim area. The shuttle service for each car rental company is located just outside the baggage claim and can take you directly to the car park. Rates range from about \$18 for a compact car to \$100 for a luxury SUV. Car rental companies can be contacted using free phones available near baggage claim areas. If you want to easily get around the city, specifically if you are planning some trips from The Strip that are not guided tours, you will want to rent a car. Many visitors decide to rent a car to escape to picturesque places outside the city. Don't worry about where to park as all hotels have rental parking. Taxi: The lengthy taxi rank is located just outside the eastern side of the baggage claim area at the airport, outside exits 1 to 5. Airport staff are available on the kerb taxi to help you mark one. Please note that you will be charged USD 1.20 for all fares originating from the airport. From the airport, you can expect to pay \$8 to \$9.50 for a taxi ride at the southern end of the Strip, \$9.50 to \$12 to get to the downtown Strip, \$13 to reach the Stratosphere Hotel, and \$15 to \$17 to get to downtown Las Vegas. This flat fee is in addition to what you choose to tip the driver, which is generally \$1 to \$2 for a fare under \$10. If the fare is higher, which is possible in this spread out city, and if the driver is friendly and helps with your luggage, you can end up paying a 15 to 20 percent tip. Before crouching in the cabin, keep in mind that the number of passengers is limited to a maximum of five people. Public transport: You can catch a shuttle service on the north and west sides of the baggage claim area, just outside exits 8 to 14. Bell Trans and Grayline/Coach (702-739-5700) are the two most popular, but there are five companies that service the Las Vegas area. A shuttle service between the airport and the Strip costs about \$4 per person and about \$5 per person for a ride between the airport and downtown Las Vegas. The shuttle runs in this 24-hour, 7 day service in this 24-hour city and is the best choice as it is closer to the baggage claim area and the drivers are helpful with luggage and tourist information. Also, the shuttle often provides magazines with coupons and up-to-date information headlines and attractions in Vegas. Another option is to use the Citizens Area Transit Bus System, located on the ground floor of McCarran. A one-way fare on Route 301 to The Strip will cost \$2; one-way off-strip fares on other routes will cost \$1.25. A total of 49 bus lines are available to take you around Las Vegas and the surrounding area, so contact the Citizens Area Transit System (702-228-7433) for the latest plans. Driving In Rush hour: With huge growth occurring in Las Vegas, out-of-towners should be aware that the spike can be hectic. Rush hour is usually between 06:30 and 10:00 and 15:00 and 18:30. During these designated times, Interstate 15 and U.S. 95 clog up with commuters traveling east and west and north to south. And Rainbow Curve, area 95 between Lake Mead and Jones Boulevards running both north and south, becomes a virtual parking lot, like the Spaghetti Bowl, where Interstate 15 and US 95 cross. Rules of the road: Las Vegas is built on a grid, so if you happen to get a little lost, continue to take the rights or left and you'll end up where you started. When driving in Las Vegas, watch out for the taxi driver. They are notorious for quickly cutting in front of you, or flying across three lanes to turn left from the right turn lane. Many visiting drivers do not understand that you can turn right on the red light (unless otherwise noted). The locals will quickly remind you of this with a long, healthy honking if you hesitate. How to get around public transport, fare: Citizens Area Transit Bus System has routes running along the Strip for 24 hours, but be careful if you head to other areas like downtown where you can catch a bus only from 5:30 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. You don't get stuck far from your hotel room and end up paying \$40 for a taxi to drive you back. One-way bus fare on The Strip is USD 2 per ride; \$1.25 in other areas such as downtown. Accurate fare is always required. The Las Vegas Strip Trolley is a convenient way to travel Las Vegas Boulevard from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. daily. North Loop trolleybus serves the main hotels Strip and South Loop, then among others goes to the South Coast Hotel & Casino and Las Vegas Outlet Center. The price is \$2.50 per ride, and an exact fare is required. The Deuce is a double-decker bus that serves Las Vegas Boulevard. You can choose between 53 seats in the upper deck and 27 seats in the lower deck. One-way fare is \$2 or you can buy an all-day pass for \$5. Las Vegas Monorail runs along the east side of The Strip between the Mobil Three-Star MGM Grand and the Mobil Two-Star Sahara Hotels. This is a relatively new addition to Las Vegas, and it has yet to come to all the loops. Monorail breaks down several times with passengers on board who have to wait for it to be repaired or get off the tracks. The price is \$5 for a one-way ticket, \$9 for a two-way ticket, \$40 for a three-day pass. On the west side of the belt there are two mono-track rides for free. One tram runs 24 hours a day between Excalibur, the three-star Luxor Mobil and the three-star Mandalay Bay. The other monochool system travels between Mobile Three-Star Treasure Island and Mobile Three-Star Mirage from 7 a.m. to 2 a.m. daily. Taxis, on foot or by bike: Basic taxi fare is \$3 for the first mile, \$1.80 for each additional mile and \$.35 per minute while stopping at a red light. Taxis can hold up to five passengers. Beware of taxi drivers who might try to take you a long way around the city to get to the hotel. McCarran Airport is nestled against the southern end of the Strip and most hotels are no more than a \$20 taxi ride away. If you plan to hoove it in Las Vegas, join the crowd. The winter, autumn and spring months are ideal for walks from hotel to hotel. Hotels are set up to get you to your property so you won't have to wander far. They want to make it as easy as possible to come and spend money, which is why they spent a lot of money on elevated sidewalks that will carry you through major intersections along the Strip. If you are interested in cycling to your destination, you will quickly find that this is not a city suitable for cyclists. You can rent bikes, mopeds, Segways and scooters on The Strip, but with clogged sidewalks and fast-moving cabins, these are not very popular modes of transport. And there aren't many bike racks to hold items when you've veered away from the next big attraction you'll come across. In fact, the only bikes you see on the Strip belong to the Las Vegas Police Department on patrol. Although there are bike paths in many residential neighborhoods, the most serious cyclists get out of town into the picturesque, and cooler, mountainous areas with maintained bike paths. Obviously, if you're into gambling and at the show, you've come to the right place. But Las Vegas offers much more than casinos and exhibitions - if you're interested, you can find such unique places as the Atomic Test Museum and botanical cactus garden. Bellagio Fountains & Conservatory & Botanical Garden Andrew Zairvny/Shutterstock Fountains Bellagio will appear in almost every Las Vegas movie that has ever been made, including the iconic end of Ocean's Eleven. Create your own crime caper or rom-com ends and catch the Bellagio fountains in action. The free show plays every 15 to 30 minutes, depending on the time of day, and watching it is one of the best free things to do in Las Vegas. A rotating cast of jugglers, acrobats, airmen and stuntmen on roller skates will please children of all ages (and cash-occupancy parents who will play with the new carnival prizes). Round off the fun with an exciting show from circus clowns circus on the main stage of Midway. Let the fact that all this fun is free to alleviate any lingering clown phobia. Downtown Container Park Kobby Dagan / Shutterstock A giant mechanical praying mantis welcomes visitors to this open-air park made of repurposed shipping containers. There are shops, restaurants, bars and a stage for free live music performances. Children can enjoy The Treehouse, a playground with a slide and building blocks, until 21:00 .m. every day (when the park becomes an adult only). Wildlife Habitat at Flamingo Las Vegas Weichen/Shutterstock You'll likely come across a number of colorful creatures on the Las Vegas Strip, from party bachelorettes with anatomically correct lollipops to celebrities to their worst behaviors. I'll see a different kind of pomp in Flamingo Las Vegas, with its habitat full of pink birds. A flock (actually called pomp) of Chilean flamingos can be seen in the free exhibition, which also includes a number of swans, ducks, koi fish and turtles that live between leaves and waterfalls. Located next to the pool, the location is one of the great free things to do in Las Vegas for hotel guests and non-guests. Volcano in The Mirage Jerry Sharp/Shutterstock Well, this place really blew up. With the soundtrack of Grateful Dead drummer Mickey Hart and Indian table drummer Zakir Hussain, the heart-pounding audio/visual appeal of the Polynesian-themed Mirage spews fire into the air starting at 8:00 p.m.m. every night, which is one of the most memorable free shows in Las Vegas. Smoke that volcano spews more than 100 feet above it is actually perfumed with a pleasant smell of pina colada (to hide the smell of natural gas). The spectacle rivals the well-known fountains at the Bellagio, another free attraction in Las Vegas, just half a mile down the Strip. Pinball Hall of Fame TripAdvisor This nonprofit museum please-touch is actually the largest collection of pinball machines in the world. In 10,000 square feet of space, you will find an assortment of more than 200 pinball machines and arcade games from half a century of gaming history. And every game is playable, from 1992 Super Mario Bros. wooden machine 1947 Heavy Hitter. Admission is free, although games are operated on coins (25 or 50 cents per game). Just arm yourself knowing that all excess income goes to charity. Who knew doing good could be such good old-fashioned fun? Aquarium at Silverton Hotel and TripAdvisor Casino The only sting is from jellyfish. Consistently ranked one of the best free

things to do in Las Vegas, the massive marine aquarium at Silverton Hotel and Casino will transport you from the lazily into a huge tropical oasis. Around 117,000 gallons of saltwater house thousands of fish, sharks, stingrays and reef plants. Interactive feeding demonstrations and mermaid shows round out the offerings.
