The best day taylor swift lyrics meaning

Sure, she's known for digging into her personal life in song, but she has also parlayed her creative talents into other forms of writing. For example, in 2017, when she would appear on the cover of British Vogue, instead of granting an accompanying interview, T. Swift chose to write a poem she called the title: The Trick to Holding On. Here's an excerpt: They don't tell you this when you're young/ You don't stick to anything/Can't show up for anyone. Will she make a song out of it? Is she trying to be a more formal writer? Taylor Swift has won 10 Grammys Jason LaVeris/FilmMagic/Getty Images All Too Well is the fifth song on Red. Eric Reed/Invision/AP What began as a deep cut on Red was quickly announced as the singer's magnum opus, and for good reason. It's almost literary in how distinctive Swift tells her story of forgotten scarves, plaid shirt days, and the pain of remembering every excruciating detail of being in love after magic is no longer there. It's full of killer moments: the way she sings fridge, the way she spits out the consonants of crumpled-up piece of paper, the way she chews three 'all's in a row,' Rob Sheffield wrote on the track for Rolling Stone. No other song does such a stellar job of showing off its ability to blow up a trivial detail into a legendary sadness. Song highlight: Everything. If you like this, listen to: it on repeat. Style is the third issue on 1989. Taylor Swift/YouTube Style as GQ's Jay Willis says, is a fatalistic, vaguely noir-like account of young love in turmoil. Swift worked with pop-production masters Max Martin and Shellback to create this synth-pop masterpiece that is so rock-solid even Swift can't keep herself from referring in later works. The opening line of the second verse, So it goes, became a track title on Reputation, while take me home was transformed from a cheeky nod to One Direction's sophomore album into a heartfelt plea for her beloved on 2019's Lover. With the risk of sounding corny, Style is really one of the few pop songs this decade that doesn't (and won't) go out of style. Song highlight: The way lyrics like You've got that James Dean daydream look in your eye, make the track feel like it was (allegedly) written about the cool, rocker Harry Styles we know today, rather than the 18-year-old, baby-faced Styles that Swift dated in the fall of 2012. If you like this, listen to: Out of the Woods. Cornelia Street is the ninth issue on Lover. Republic Records Swift inserted numerous callbacks to her previous works on Lover, but there was no song that felt most like the Old Taylor over Cornelia Street. From autumn scenes to memories in kitchens, there are plenty of parallels between this track and Swift's magnum opus, All Too Well. But while All Too Well is about a love lost forever, Cornelia Street is about a love Swift fears losing more than anything. It is a wonderful highlight of her past work that shows how far the singer has grown in her romantic life, while acknowledging the lessons of vulnerability she has learned and that at any moment everything she has built could disappear. Nevertheless, Cornelia Street is the kind of triumph in love that fans waited 13 years to see. Song highlight: The breath of how she sings, And baby, I am stunned by how this city screams your name. Also the live acoustic version of Swift's Swift's from Lover concert special is pure perfection. If you like this, listen to: New Year's Day. Teardrops on My Guitar is taylor swift's third song. Swift found early success in her career with the second single from her debut album. Teardrops on My Guitar was a definitive country song that found its way to the pop charts, a harbinger of Swift's eventual full-time crossover for the genre. The ease with which 'Teardrops' translated into straight pop showed that her deft melodic touch and conversational manner with deeply felt emotions could scale to the widest possible audience, Maura Johnston wrote for Pitchfork. Today, her production takes its cue from current trends, and its subjects don't need to be identified through online fishing expeditions, but its detailed texts and canny worldview were there from the start. Song highlight: So I'll drive home alone / As I turn out the light / I'll put his picture down / And maybe get some sleep tonight. If you like this, listen to: Tim McGraw. I Knew You Were Trouble is the fourth song on Red. Taylor Swift/YouTube Although 2012's Red wasn't a full departure from the country, Swift proved her interest in cross-genre experimentation with I Knew You Were Trouble, a pop-rock, dubstep-infused bop about getting involved with someone you suspect isn't right for you from the start. As Brad Nelson wrote for Pitchfork, it was as if she had finally found a musical background sharp as her lyrics - the lakes and backroads of Tennessee and Georgia disappearing, replaced by formations of jagged crystal, a perfect setting for a song about falling in love with someone you know will hurt you and leave you feeling empty like a canyon. Song highlight: Pretend he doesn't know / That he's the reason why / You're drowning, you're drowning, you're drowning. If you like this, listen to: Red. Clean is the 13th and last song in 1989. For those who stan a Swift closing number, Clean is the holy grail. It sums up so succinctly everything she had learned over the course of 1989, while at the same time providing a glimmer of hope to her listeners that their storm will also pass. Neil McCormick called the track understated and atmospheric in a 1989 review for The Telegraph, adding that Clean offers a truth and power rare in commercialized pop. The Guardian's Alexis Petridis praised the opening line, The Drought was the worst, for not only a striking line that allows a pop song to open, but also because you can't imagine any of Taylor Swift's competitors coming up with anything remote like it. Song highlight: Rain came pouring down when I drowned/ That's when I could finally breathe. If you like this, listen to: Daylight. Blank Space is the 1989. YouTube Swift's 2014 album 1989 has been hailed as a pop masterpiece, and it in part that acclaim thanks to the satirical Blank Space. The song, which was nominated for three Grammy Awards, is an excitingly vicious riff on Swift's reputation as a man-eater, according to Mikael Wood of The Los Angeles Times. While Swift would later analyze the perception of her public persona more fully at the 2017 Reputation, it was Blank Space that first gave her the means to call out the media in a record-breaking, chart-topping way. Song highlight: Because darling I'm a nightmare dressed as a daydream. If you like this, listen to: I did something bad. Don't Blame Me is the fourth issue on Reputation. Netflix's Swift previously told Rolling Stone that she had never had an album that made more sense to people after they came to the concert like she did with Reputation Until That Moment, her songs were just great songs, but she never had songs that came to life. If I were to choose a single song in Swift's discography that really has a life of its own that was ever performed, Is it Don't Blame Me. We are so blessed that every second of her Reputation Stadium Tour performance has been immortalized by Netflix so we can witness again and again every epic moment — like when she hurls herself to the ground as she sings As You Walk Away/ I would beg you to stay on my knees or when she throws her arms out like Jesus to the cross like a choir swells behind her before she hits a series of towering notes. But while the song makes for an amazing live performance, it's also an exciting listening experience on its own. As Monique Melendez writes for SPIN: Sonic speaking, there's something wonderfully sacrilegious about the track, with Taylor imposing love-as-a-drug imagery over a thunderous Gothic church soundscape that applies the slick synthetic sheen of this album to Hozier's Take Me to Church. Melendez adds: Her voice lolls over the thick, dark production, and she sounds just like the fully realized adult pop star she aimed to with her earlier singles. This time, the delivery lands completely. The echoes, the self-harmonisation — everything fits together. Song highlight: The build-up on the bridge that ends in one of Swift's fiercest high notes. If you like this, listen to: False God. Love Story was released on September 12, 2008. Taylor Swift/YouTube Love Story, is perhaps the moment when Swift's songwriting prowess first fully revealed herself, Alexis Petridis wrote for The Guardian, adding that it was a fantastic song. Petridis also ranked Love Story at number 2 in a list of Swift's best songs. While Swift left the country, she brought Love Story with her in the pop space, bringing a new production on top of it to make it flawless between her later fit. As Hazel Cills wrote for Pitchfork, Swift's great remake of 'Love Story' in slick 1989-era production is proof of his timelessness. Song Song Romeo, save me, they're trying to tell me how to feel/ This love is hard, but it's real. If you like this, listen to: You're with me. Sad, Beautiful, Tragic is the 12th song on Red. Big Machine At four minutes and 44 seconds, Sad, Beautiful, Tragic, is the fourth longest song on 2012's Red, but unlike similarly long songs like All Too Well and State of Grace, the timing never felt entirely justified. The song drags on - not because Swift has a lot to say as she usually does - but because she felt the need to sing a variation of the title 11 times as slowly as she could. Worst offense: Swift could have used the album this time for an All Too Well reprise made from the lyrics she eventually cut. Saving grace: And time is taking his sweet time erasing you / And you have your demons, and, honey, they all look like me. Look What You Made Me Do was released on August 25, 2017. TaylorSwift/EVO/YouTube Look What You Made Me Do was the first song Swift released after Kimye-gate tore her down in the court of public opinion and it didn't do as much to convince people to like her again - especially since it wasn't up-to-par with Swift's earlier (and vastly superior) songwriting. Pitchfork's Meaghan Garvey summed up the track perfectly when she wrote: In her previous work, Swift has bent a real talent for forming real-life experiences in clues-filled allegories, at once personal and universal. Here she is unusually unnuanced, and when she slips into hilariously artless digs like I don't like your tilted stage, it sounds like the part of a break-up when you start hurling all the banal insults you have left. Worst offense: Swift apparently forgot how to write a choir while making this song. Saving grace: The music video is so wonderfully narrow-minded and self-involved that it actually works. It is also Jack Leopards and the best song of the Dolphin Club. This Is Why We Can't Have Nice Things is the 13th issue in 2017's Reputation. Mark Metcalfe/Getty Images Before Reputation came out, many believed it would be littered with West diss tracks just like this, so it's a shame that when the album appeared to be a broader reflection of Swift's image and the effect it had on her personal relationships, she didn't leave This Is Why We Can't Have Nice Things on the floor of the cutting room - or at least push the album earlier. This is Why We Can't Have Nice Things is a final jab in West that unnecessarily disrupted the emotional flow of Dress, Call It What You Want, and New Year's Day on the back of the record. Worst

offense: The placement on the album. Saving grace: The image of Taylor's mother, Andrea who must be stuck by endless tirades about Kim Kardashian West and Kanye West. Bad Blood is the eighth issue in 1989. Youtube / TaylorSwiftVevo Rolling Stone's Sheffield Sheffield Bad Blood dead last from Swift's 129 songs, calling it, melodically dehydrated, lyrically unfinished, [and] rhythmically awkward. Before 1989 fell in October 2014, Swift went for the track by saying it was about a fellow singer doing something terrible with her. And while that would be more than enough to excite fans about the song, the end result was disappointingly bland. Andrew Unterberger wrote for Spin. Unterberger added: There are precious few of Taylor's trademark particularities to some kind of direction regarding the subject, and in fact, the whole thing is with 'baby' and 'mad love' references that make the song sound more about a romantic relationship than a broken friendship. Worst offense: Igniting a full feud with Katy Perry. Saving grace: Kendrick Lamar (who is featured on the song) doesn't hate it? Better Than Revenge is the 10th song on Speak Now. Rick Diamond/Getty Images If there's an underlying theme running in Swift's worst songs, it's that there's nothing she does worse than revenge. Whether she's calling out the Wests or fighting with Perry, the tracks Swift wields as weapons to win feuds often fall flat - but Better Than Revenge has even more work against it in the age of mainstream feminism and waking up Twitter. In particular, the line, she is better known for the things she does on the mattress, with its slut-shaming overtones is not kosher anymore (if it once was). Worst offense: Allegedly slut-shaming Camilla Belle for having the audacity so far Joe Jonas.Saving grace: Swift acknowledged her poor judgment on the lyrics when she told The Guardian in 2014, I was 18 when I wrote that... That's the age you are when you think someone can take your boyfriend. Then you grow up and realize that no one can take someone from you if they don't want to leave. Ready for It? was officially released as the second single for Reputation on October 24, 2017. Taylor Swift / YouTube After ... Ready for It? hit ether in 2017, Mike Wass wrote of the track for Idolator, If you get past the cringeworthy lyrics and shocking production, a cute chorus awaits. But that's a lot of work for a small payout. Spin's Jordan Sargent also called the song ill-fitting, while Vulture's Craig Jenkins said it didn't reinvent pop or Taylor, but it gets its name out on a product built to keep up with current trends. Jenkins added that he couldn't understand why her reinvention is centered in rap streams and flashy eight-counts, her two worst skills. Worst offense: Younger than my exes, but he's acting like a man like that, so. Saving grace: And he could be my jailer, Burton for this Taylor. Welcome to New York is the opening number of 1989. Dilip Vishwanat/Getty Images for TAS Swift loves the Big Apple, and while some of her songs call the city - Cornelia Street, Holy Holy — made it into the top 15 on this list, its outright ode to New York missed the mark completely with its tiresome optimism. Julianne Escobedo Shepherd of Jezebel went so far as to call it a gentrification anthem. At the time of its release, actress and rapper Awkwafina told Gothamist that the song was one of those songs that, with only a single radio play, will see at least 10 New Yorkers move to Marfa, Texas. Worst offense: Saying she wouldn't change anything, anything, anything, about New York - probably because she hasn't had to go anywhere near the subway since her 2009 MTV Video Music Awards performance. Saving grace: And you want whoever you want/ Boys and boys and girls and girls. Also, when it was released prior to 1989 as a promotional single, Swift donated all proceeds to the New York City Department of Education. London Boy is the eleventh song on Lover. Matt Crossick/PA Images via Getty Images After Lover dropped on August 23, the majority of new songs received widespread acclaim - with the exception of London Boy. The upbeat track about fancying high tea and walking Camden Market in the afternoon was met with confusion and annoyance from real-life Brits who vowed that one could never make every name-dropped milestone in this track within a matter of hours. (Swift, however, later pointed out that this song is supposed to happen in the space of three years.) As Jazmin Kopotsha wrote for Refinery29, the song would be sweet if it wasn't overwritten by the wildly mishandled references to rogue locations and activities. It would be nice if it weren't for the fact that, as we play on British stereotypes here, we're all incredibly cynical and don't care for bizarre outpourings of affection. Worst offense: Rhyming pub, us with rugby. Sparingly: I hear Idris Elba's accent for a split second. King of My Heart is the tenth song on Reputation. Big Machine While it was undoubtedly exciting for fans to witness Swift finding the one she was waiting for, she didn't have to sacrifice her heart, body and soul for it. But aside from the main cringe factor of designating her boyfriend Joe Alwyn as a sovereign about her entire person, King of My Heart is, as Zach Schonfeld wrote for Newsweek, surprisingly faceless, devastated by the singer's personality, as did the automated vocal effect strips the particulars and character of her voice. Worst offense: King of my heart, body and soul, ooh whoa, but also how she pronounces Jaguars as Jag-ye-threads. Saving grace: The power in which she sings, Up on the roof with a school girl crush / Drinking beer out of plastic cups, and the taiko drum outro of the Reputation Stadium versie. Miss Americana and the Heartbreak Prince is het zevende nummer op Lover. Sundance Film Festival Miss Americana and the Heartbreak Prince is een middelbare school school about the pitfalls of American politics in the age of the Trump administration – and it doesn't quite land. While I appreciate Swift's increasing vocality about politics and current affairs, her voice is more impactful when she speaks frankly about issues on her social media platforms or through a Netflix documentary than when she disguises her anger in homecoming queen metaphors. Worst offense: Not only is it not a great political song, but it's also not even Swift's best song about high school. Saving grace: It inspired the name of Swift's documentary, Miss Americana, which is a brilliant glimpse into her life, stardom, and yes, personal politics. The go, fight, win cheerleading chants sprinkled by the song was also a stroke of genius. You Are in Love is featured on the deluxe edition of 1989. Kevin Winter/WireImage It's just disappointing that a song about realizing you're completely in love is about a relationship that ultimately didn't work - and wasn't even one out of Swift's own life. Swift previously revealed that the song was written about Lena Dunham and frequent collaborator Jack Antonoff. [The lyrics are] just really things they told me. And I think that kind of relationship - God, it sounds like it would just be so beautiful - would also be difficult. It would also be commonplace at times, Swift told Tavi Gevinson for ELLE. While Swift is usually great at outsourcing material for songs like Love Story (Romeo and Juliet) and Death by a Thousand Cuts (Netflix's Someone Great), these eventually fell flat. It's OK though, because they finally nailed all the mundane and beautiful aspects of finding your forever person on Lover, which rightly earned his place among Swift's best songs on this list. Worst offense: About Dunham and her now failed relationship with Antonoff. Saving grace: It gave Swift the concept of inspiration for her Lover music video. This is an opinion column.
