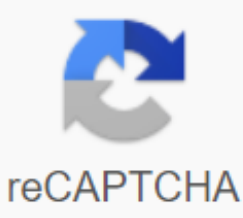




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Doe calendar 2020 21 nyc

If you have a child in public school, you live according to the school calendar. The 2020-21 school year has already started surprisingly, with last week's announcement that the first day of school has been postponed. Many local NYC kindergartens follow the public school schedule, too. The New York City Department of Education's agenda for the 2020-2021 school year is below, and you'll now want to bookmark it for reference and to help plan family vacations and school holiday camp coverage. Of course, we've been reminded time and again that this school year will be one unlike any other, so the dates may not be as set in stone as in recent years, but parents now at least have a framework. These are all the dates you count on that your kiddos are out of school or away from their remote learning device, during the 2020-2021 school year. Wednesday 16 September-Friday 18 September: Remote school days for students. Monday 21 September: First full day of school; mixed learning begins. Monday, September 28: Yom Kippur, schools closed Monday, October 12: Columbus Day, schools closed Tuesday, November 3: Election Day, fully remote educational day for all students. Wednesday, November 11: Veterans Day, schools closed Thursday, November 26-Friday November 27: Thanksgiving Recess, schools closed Thursday, December 24-Friday January 1: WinterRecs, schools closed Monday, January 18: Dr. Martin

Luther King Jr. Day, schools closed Monday, February 1: Day of professional development for 9-12 and 6-12 schools in districts 1-32 only; pupils in these schools. After an agreement was reached between City Hall and the largest union representing New York City teachers, the Department of Education has released its academic calendar for the 2020-21 school year. On Wednesday, September 16, a three-day transition period of remote instruction begins. The following Monday, September 21, the school buildings open full power for blended learning. This year's calendar includes typical national holidays, parent-teacher conferences, early release days, and breaks between semesters. New this year: students will be instructed entirely remotely on Election Day, November 3. The release of the school year calendar was significantly delayed due to the coronavirus pandemic. Until last week, school administrators and DIY staff were still finalizing safety protocols for students and teachers. Electrostatic cleansing, social distancing, mask mandates and many other measures already discussed will remain in force in the future. Certified nurses will also be present in every school, says the mayor, and there will be a well-stocked supply of PPE. We have to be careful. New York is very much the exception to what's going on around the world with COVID. But we need to protect that progress, Gov. Andrew Cuomo said on a teleconference Sunday. NBC New York's Anjali Hemphill reports. Even with the strict inspections and other safety measures, some parents still have concerns about whether it's safe to start in person now. As of Tuesday, more than a third - 37 percent - of families with children in public schools opted out of the standard hybrid model, with 366,553 requests for distance learning. The city will make free testing available each month at each school in a way that maximizes the ease of getting tested, Mayor Bill de Blasio has said. That will be part of a rigorous monthly medical monitoring program where 10 to 20 percent of students and staff at each school tested every month, with results within 48 hours. Children get a softer swab test, rather than the more uncomfortable nasal passage NYC DOE announced it will immediately add a total of 4,500 total educators to schools and classrooms. Individuals will be hired from a DOE replacement teacher pool, current DOE staff, and the CUNY system (graduate students, adjunct professors, etc.) The NYC DOE created three models of personal instruction that schools can choose from, based on the size of and what works best for the student body, along with an all-remote learning model parents can choose for any reason: Model 1: Students receive personal instruction for the same two days a week, as well as every other Monday. Model 2: Students receive personal instruction 1-2 days a week. Model 3 (available only for middle and high schools): Allows students to spend two days and four days at a distance in a six-day cycle. District 75 schools have two additional model options. Students with IEPs are offered as much personal instruction as possible. Multilingual students, Carranza said, will receive instruction that will keep them ahead in both languages. Once the school year begins, you choose to go completely secluded at any time. We now know that 74 percent of NYC students will participate in personal learning and 26 percent will start the school year in full learning remotely. We can expect about eighty-five percent of our teacher workforce or about sixty-six thousand educators to teach in a mixed mode as well, Carranza said in the August 10 briefing. About 15 percent of teachers have asked to work from home. Those who are granted that accommodation will only learn remotely, but... they will still be involved and committed as ever to educating the children of New York City, because that's who they are, Carranza said. The city will offer free day care to 100,000 students for days when they don't go to school in person to help relieve parents stress from online learning. InsideSchools, a website that provides insight into the NYC education scene, is now offering a free online class for families called How to Support Online Learning at Home. The course provides insight to families to help them navigate the online learning process, with everything including your goals, online learning in NYC schools, the challenges of online learning, getting the most out of your family's devices, creating a learning schedule, and activity ideas to complement your child's learning. In addition, more than 300,000 iPads have been distributed to those who need them to provide a quality, online academic experience for students in New York City. NYC teachers are also trained to be more effective online instructors. According to Carranza, the curriculum will be updated to reflect learning model and to provide appropriate socio-emotional learning and mental health supports. How NYC Public Schools Will Keep Students Students Teachers Safe Outside Learning is an option being presented to a number of schools. de Blasio encourages all public, private and charter schools in NYC to use outdoor space for learning, or on their own grounds, with help from the city, or elsewhere. The plan follows pleas from educators, parents, lawyers and officials asking the mayor to allow schools to keep out classes where the risk of infection is lower. de Blasio says it's up to school principals to determine how to use the outdoor outdoors, but the DOE will work with principals to open up more space, such as local parks and streets, if necessary. Schools in the 27 districts hardest hit by the virus will be given the first priority for outdoor space options. Here are some important things to know about how NYC's public schools will keep everyone safe: Face masks and social distancing are required. All people in each school building will be required to wear face coverings and stay 6 feet apart from others. Disposable masks are provided to anyone who needs them. According to de Blasio, 4 million face masks will be distributed among NYC schools along with 210,000 safety boards to enforce social distancing. Carranza told parent leaders that students who refuse to wear masks at school, with the exception of those who cannot wear them for health or development reasons, are sent home and banned from personal learning, reports Chalkbeat. The schools are severely limiting the number of students in the classroom at once with the in-person learning models described above. In addition, the DOE is in talks with the diocese and archdiocese to use some of the former Catholic school buildings to give public schools more room to disperse, de Blasio said. Schools have hygiene supplies on hand. The DOE buys large orders of hygiene supplies for schools, including face coverings for students, teachers and staff; disinfectant; electrostatic sprinklers. 3.5 million bottles of hand sanitizer and 80,000 canisters of disinfectant wipes will be distributed among NYC schools, along with 7,350 maintenance workers working to disinfect schools at night. Schools are disinfected with electrostatic disinfection sprays. De Blasio also announced that every school building in New York City will have a certified nurse by the fall. Systems will be upgraded so that buildings have better ventilation. As part of each school's reopening plans, school ventilation action teams have inspected all NYC classrooms to ensure their ventilation systems are safe to use School. Rooms that fail the inspection will either be brought to standard before the school year begins or will not be used. Teams consist of independent experts and engineers, according to Carranza. Each action team has a checklist of room size and occupancy, or windows can open, and exams and exhaust fans. The Department of Education is establishing a new hotline for principals to call should they need to speed up the delivery of any of these materials. According to Chancellor Carranza, unannounced school sting inspections will be carried out to check the safety of each building. School bus rules are enacted Parents are still waiting for specific details from their districts regarding bussing, but these precautions will be taken in neighborhoods: 25 percent capacity Face masks required Students will sit next to a window in every other row Only siblings are allowed to sit together Buses are disinfected every day Parents are not allowed in school buildings, for the most part. When asked about segregation and problems with preschoolers transitioning to the school day, de Blasio said we should be careful with parents coming into school buildings, so it's largely not going to happen. I can tell you many scenes from my children's childhood, where I thought that in their younger years, they were going to have a terrible divorce experience and I was ready to hold on with them and help them through, and what quickly became clear is that they couldn't wait to see their friends, and they said a very quick goodbye to me and walked into class , he said. Our youngest children are incredibly adaptable. ... The first days will be a bit challenging as always, but then we will find a way to make it work. Test and trace protocols are in place. On July 30, Carranza and de Blasio announced testing and tracking protocols that will apply to all school communities and help prevent the spread of COVID-19. All staff will be asked to take a COVID-19 test in the days before the first day of school and will have priority for free, expedited testing at 34 city-run test sites. All schools will be required to adopt precautions to help prevent, identify, and address the spread of COVID-19, including: An isolation room for students with symptoms with a staff member or health worker Physical distancing and facial covering Cleaning during the day and disinfecting at night Clear communication with families and the school community If a student or teacher feels ill , they should stay at home and, if their symptoms are consistent with COVID-19, get tested. If a student feels symptoms while at school, they are isolated by a dedicated staff member until he or she is picked up by his parents. Staff who became symptomatic at school must leave the building immediately. On top of having the medical staff for each school, we're going to have a very strong presence in our schools, from the Test and Trace Corps as well, to make sure in the case of each case that there is immediate follow-up at the school level, de Blasio said. The DOE is working with DOHMH and the NYC Test + Trace Corps to action and the spread of COVID-19. Decisions to quarantine classrooms or close schools will be based on the conclusions of possible investigations. The details of possible research conclusions are described below: Cuomo also announced that all New York schools, including the K-12 and SUNY schools, will be required to provide the Department of Health with daily data on the number of people who have tested positive for COVID-19 to create a COVID report map. A SUNY system-wide COVID-19 case tracker dashboard went live this past weekend and is designed to provide real-time information on coronavirus cases, testing, quarantine, and isolation space in SUNY's 64 colleges and universities. Parents may be concerned about how their children will cope with returning to school, and de Blasio and Carranza have announced The Bridge to School Plan that aims to support students, educators and parents across the city with guided language activities, community-building exercises, and socially emotional learning classes and activities. This program is designed to help children build skills and increase teachers' access to trauma response. NYC principals began trauma response and educational practice training this summer and all school staff will be offered this training when the school year begins. With the help of Child Mind Institute, an NYC DOE helpline is implemented for educators to call and access best practices to help students with mental health.
