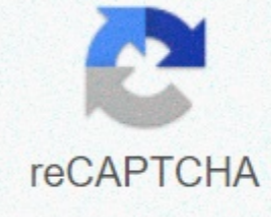




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Glaciation worksheet ks3

It's strange to think so, but technically, we're in the middle of ice time right now. Fortunately, however, it is a relatively warm part of one. In the country's 4.5 billion-year history, ice age has come and gone, and glaciers have sometimes reached the equator. And where it happened, LIZ BONN: it has created some of the most spectacular landscapes on the planet. Let's see how the glacier has created a climber's paradise in Yosemite National Park, California. There's a warning in this clip. Looking at it can take a head to height. About three million years ago, the continents of North and South America collided. Result? A warm sea stream flowed around the equatorial. Now the warm water was heading north. Today, we know this stream as the Gulf Stream. Strange as it may seem, it was this warm current that brought down the planet into the ice age. As the warm waters evaporated, this brought more moisture to the cold northern regions of the planet, so more snow fell. And slowly the northern hemisphere froze, causing global cooling. Over the past three million years, the ice has evolved and receded more than 50 times. If I stood here 20,000 years ago, there'd be over a mile of ice above my head. And while much of it has melted and withdrawn, permanent ice still covers 10 percent of the planet's surface. So the ice is still good and really with us. Although a few million years is just a blink of an eye in the life of the planet, this recent ice age has had an extraordinary impact on our world and on us. As we can see, it changed the climate around the planet, and in doing so it drove human evolution. And it carved out many of the most dramatic landscapes we know today. READER: 'If you head to Yosemite National Park in California, you'll just get a good idea. efficient ice shapes the landscape on a gigantic scale. Glaciers are responsible for carving many cliffs, but few are as epic as this one. El Capitan. READER: 'It's the ice that has made El Capitan the biggest challenge in rock climbing. READER: 'And for Leo Houlding, one of the best climbers in the world, nothing quite matches it. LEO HOULDING: 'We call El Cap Big Daddy. This is 1,000 meters high and it's damn close vertical all the way. Your first reaction is horror. Only its scale is really scary even for very experienced climbers. There is basically no easy way up, LEO HOULDING: it is the hardest cliff in the world to climb. Two million years ago, yosemite valley looked different. A landscape of steep V-shaped valleys carved by rivers. But then the glaciers formed in these mountains. Slowly, they flowed down the valleys, grinding sideways into hard granitstone. When the ice receded, it left behind a deep U-shaped valley. Classic signs of glacier activity are everywhere. Huge boulders are picked from the cliffs, which are transported by ice for miles. Waterfalls reveal where ancient river valleys are cut off into the middle stream. Are typical of recent glacier tactics. The stone face is almost vertical. The ice took the other side of the granite mountain and over tens of thousands of years, which is why this rock is so steep. READER: 'The glacier moved over the granite grinding it over a hundred kilos at every square centimeter. It polished the stone into a treat. LEO HOULDING: 'Whoa, I slip, I slip. At the limit of friction. Urgh, what are you doing? GASPS Urgh, what are you doing? It's so smooth and slippery, urgh. You have to keep your weight close to the wall. But when bad weather closes... This rock wall becomes a climber's nightmare. LEO HOULDING: 'It's getting really wet and... This glass rock is about to turn into an ice rink. I might fall out of here. Oh, my God. There's a chance I'm going down. It would be reckless to keep climbing. Leo needs to find one of the few shelters El Capitan has to offer. Even if it rains, it's a great feeling to be here. Dean, I'm safe. Great. What a great ascent. It's a magical place. It's like Mother Nature created this place for rock climbers. This is about physical geography and it was both.
