Mario Kart is one of Nintendo's most powerful franchise titles available on almost every Nintendo console and handheld released in the past two decades and has sold more than 100 million copies - but Nintendo is eyeing a much larger potential audience by bringing Mario Kart to mobile phones. When the Mario Kart Tour was first announced more than a year ago, online reactions were mixed. Some folks were rightly hyped up by the prospect of playing Mario Kart on the phone, while others were worried that a free-to-play Mario Kart app might be bogged down in micro-transactions. Now that the closed Android beta version of the Mario Kart Tour has begun, we're starting to see screenshots and video clips leak out of brash beta testers breaking beta rules. Along with the leaks, we've gathered some other impressions around the tech news industry to make sense of what Nintendo has put on the table. Mario Kart Tour is a free-to-play kart racing that is currently in beta tested in Japan and the United States. Familiar gameplay is fun and charming, and all your favorite Mario Kart characters, carts, and courses too - although most of the things are hidden in the game's loot box-style reward system. Designed for simplified one-handed control - similar to Super Mario Run. Since I haven't had a chance to check out the beta firsthand, I've looked around at all the brash testers willing to post some gameplay footage. The video above was provided by TonesqueTech and offers an unedited look at playing the first three tracks. Mario Kart Tour aims to play by holding the phone in one hand, turning to automatic acceleration and swipe controls. The basic gameplay remains intact, the item boxes randomly deliver you power-ups on the pitch and appear to have a full roster of returning characters to unlock and play. Ethan Gach of Kotaku writes that while the game is fun and does a good job of adapting the franchise's smartphones to the current state of the reward system that swamps the game down. Nintendo has found huge success in free-to-play with in-app purchases model Fire Emblem Heroes reportedly generating nearly \$500 million in revenue on its own, leaving prospects for milking a premier franchise like Mario Kart's identical model Nothing what we've seen or read so far is set in stone, as is the nature of beta testing. In the early release of The Verge, he mentions the bet that in addition to the stars, green gem and coin currency systems, the game also includes an endurance system that uses immersing hearts every 15 minutes and can obviously be recharged with in-app purchases. Having only seen used gameplay footage and first impressions of other game journalists, I honestly feel like the Mario Kart Tour is being formed to the Dry Bones shell of what the Mario Kart game. It seems like the loot box system will make you mindlessly swipe through every tournament just grinding to earn enough coins or gems to give you a chance at unlocking one of the characters you actually want to play as. These gameplay limitations feel particularly strange, given that it's the same franchise that let up to eight people wirelessly connect just one cartridge to the Nintendo DS. Of course, I'm trying not to judge a game that's still in the early beta testing phase. The game is expected to see a wide release sometime this summer and hopefully by then there will be a clearer look at the game mode and mechanics - because if the basic gameplay is fun and holds up the series' reputation, the nostalgia factor alone could make Mario Kart Tour one of the biggest games of 2019. On April 28, an updated version of Mario Kart 8 will be released on Nintendo's new hybrid console, receiving growing rave reviews. Back in the Wii U, Mario Kart 8 sold more than 8 million copies and received excellent rating scores. For example, we earned an Amazing score of 9.0/10 on our sister site IGN. And based on 82 reviews aggregated meta critic, number 8 has an average score of 88/100. Even though the Wii U could only handle the game at 720p, it was visually striking and played like a dream. And despite the social limitations of online mode, it's still incredibly fun to compete with 11 other real people. Now on the Switch, Mario Kart 8 Deluxe doesn't have much to offer in the innovation department, but it's still the most impressive Mario Kart release to date. Running at a native 1080p while docked, and maintaining 720p in handheld mode, this remastered version of Mario Kart 8 hit up its point on IGN by a third of a point. Even more surprisingly, the rerelease meta score is a whopping six points higher than the original one - with a score of 94/100, with 54 reviews. So, other than the higher resolution, what's the big difference? Right outside the gate, it includes everything from Wii U DLC packages, some character, a smart smart Feature for beginners, the new 200cc class, and five new combat modes. Better yet, all that is open is right outside the gate, so you don't have to waste your time getting up to speed up. At Digital Foundry, a detailed look at the Switch reveals the technical strengths and weaknesses of Mario Kart 8 Deluxe. While Nintendo's great art style works well in both docked and manual modes, the game didn't sting as much. You won't find extra pizzazz except for the higher resolution. Just like the Wii U original, no anti-aliasing is on offer, so you'll find nasty pixel skid in some places. And despite the fact that thanks to the higher resolution, the purity of soil textures has slightly improved, the same bilinear filtration is used. While overall fidelity has not improved as much as we would like, the Deluxe version does fix one of the strangest issues of the original release. In the last generation, Mario Kart 8 actually dropped one frame per second - so the output is effectively 59fps. This time this problem is no more, so you get to enjoy the real 60fps racing. And as a surprise to absolutely no one, load time off from Switch cassette is noticeably faster than the disc version of the Wii U release. We're not sure yet how the load times compare when they load directly from both consoles from the internal SSD storage, but it's safe to assume that the difference will be much smaller than pairing from disk to cart. You may have been playing Mario Kart 8 Deluxe on the Nintendo Switch solo for a while and are now ready to compete with the world's elite. You may have been beating each and every one of your friends on the hardest courses at the fastest speed and want to see if they really are that good or they're just being bad. Whatever the reason, you can join online competitions to see if you've got what it takes to compete with big dogs (or gorillas, in this case). Note: To play online tournaments, you must be connected to the Internet. How to join a tournament in Mario Kart 8 Deluxe, if you know the tournament code If a friend sends you a code to join a tournament, you can jump into the action without trying to track it down from the list. Select Play Online on the Mario Kart 8 menu screen. Select Race. Select Search by Code. Enter the 12-digit code. Select Connect. If a race is already in progress, when you join a tournament, you will be a spectator until the race is over. You can then join the next race in the tournament. How to join Mario Kart 8 Deluxe tournaments, join any tournament by searching active tournaments or selecting tournaments with specific conditions. Select Play Online on the Mario Kart 8 menu screen. Select Contest Select Find Active Tournaments to see a list of currently active tournaments. Some Some will be listed as active, but won't necessarily have anyone competing at the time. This usually happens when someone creates a race that is available for hours or days. Unfortunately, you still have to wait for at least one other person to join the race if you want to really compete. Select Search by race type to search for a race that meets certain criteria. This is a good way for new players to find easier tournaments. You can set the tournament mode to 50 or 100cc and allow smart steering, and even filter player ratings for lower scores, so you can compete with players that are similar to your own experience. Select the search criteria for the contests you are looking for. Don't be too specific or you won't find tournaments that meet your needs. Select OK to start the search. Select the tournament you want to join. Select Connect. If a race is already in progress, when you join a tournament, you will be a spectator until the race is over. You can then join the next race in the tournament. How to create a race in Mario Kart 8 Deluxe If you don't want to wait or are looking for a race that meets your criteria, you can create your own. On the game menu, choose Online Play. Select Contest from the Online Game menu. Select Create a tournament. Select Yes to confirm that you want to create a race. Select an icon for the contest that will be displayed to the public. Select OK. This information will be public and therefore do not use any personal (or offensive) information. Select OK when you're done naming the race. Set the tournament rules and choose when you will be active. You can set the tournament to take place weekly, daily, or on a specific day. You can select the start and finish times and select the number of tournaments for the entire tournament. After the tournament is created, make a note of the code.
