PunchbowlOld Hawaiians use this bowl-shaped crater for very different purposes than it is used today. They called it Puowaina, which means a mountain of human sacrifices. Today, the area is sacred for some other reason. It's home to the Pacific National Memorial Cemetery. A large marble memorial is dedicated to more soldiers missing from the action. The view from Punchbowl is also inspiring. When you first enter the Punchbowl bear to the left and continue up the hill until you reach the view, which offers views of Diamondhead. & amp; Laie Trail FallsLa'ie is a peaceful little seaside village on the northeastern tip of the island. It's best known for its great Mormon influence. In 1865, Mormons bought 6,000 acres of land and eventually built similar to salt lake city. Laie Falls is a 15-foot drop on the La'ie Ridge Trail and this is the first big stop for a hike. A lot of hikers take a quick dip here and then head back out. Temple Valley Memorial Park is located on the wind side of Oahu in the Ahuimanu region. This is a favorite gathering place where people all believe in enjoying peace and guiet. Its gardens honor many faiths, including Christianity and Buddhism. There is also a Japanese Second World War cemetery. The Temples Valley is worth visiting, especially if you're looking for peace - away from honolulu city traffic. Chinese hat This little cone-shaped piece of lava from Kualoa Point is officially named Mokoli, but has earned the nickname Chinese hat for its resemblance to the straw hats worn by Chinese immigrants. It used to be a small piece of land in Oahus, but through years of erosion it has been separated. You can still get it. At low tide you can walk from Kualoa Regional Park. You can surf or kayak there. The island supports an interesting amount of marine life and a small beach in a secluded cove. Diamond Head State MonumentDiamond Head State Monument, also known as Le'ahi, is located just east of Waikiki, on the island of Oahu, and is the most recognized landmark in Hawaii. Le'ahi is a place that offers a vacation on busy highways in Honolulu. The drive around Diamond Head is guite pictures around the crater by the ocean. When you enter through a tunnel that bored the side of the crater, it feels like a world away from the city. The monument is a very popular tourist attraction that offers informative signs, bathrooms and a shaved ice and smoothie truck during opening hours. Just 3.1 mi from downtown Honolulu, this field of vision offers the best views of Oahu. From here you can spot kailua town as well as Kaneohe Bay and of course the breathtaking Ko'olau Mountains. In 1795, Kamehameha Great troops drove the Oahu men up the hills only to force them out of these cliffs and their deaths. After that battle, Kamehameha was able to complete his search and unite the islands. Oahu's Waimea Valley lus Waimea Valley on the north shore, Oahu attracts a few thousand visitors a day but you won't know it because its stunning botanical garden setting offers plenty of spacious areas to relax under huge shady trees. It's easy to find a quiet place to rest in the grassy areas and relax on busy highways in Honolulu. Most visitors flock to Waimea Falls, a 45-foot waterfall that is located on the property, swim and as well as being a popular tourist attraction, many people also use beautiful grounds for concerts, parties, weddings, special events, and even a weekly farmers market. Honolulu Honolulu is the capital of Hawaii and the most populous city in the country. The city stretches from Pearl Harbor to the west of Makapu'u on the southeast bank of Point Oahu, which includes the world-famous area of Waikiki. Today Honolulu is home to over 390,000 people and has been the capital since 1845, when King Kamehameha III officially moved from the capital Maui to Oahu. The city is a multicultural epicenter of many historical landmarks and a host of global culinary choices, as well as a buzzing cosmopolitan city with world-class and shopping art, cultural and entertainment scene. Pearl Harbor is a lagoon port located about 10 miles west of Honolulu. This is the site of the infamous air strike by Japan in 1941, which heralded the beginning of the United States' participation in World War II. Pearl Harbor is a solemn reminder of a tragic day. It is one of the most important sites in the history of the United States and the National Historic Landmark. The area consists of several museums and monuments that honor those who served in World War II. Hanauma Bay Nature ReserveHanauma Bay Nature Preserve is a magnificent wine glass-shaped bay located in Oahu southeast of Hawaii Pier, a haven for Koko Head. Just a 30-minute drive from Honolulu (traffic allows), this stunning bay feels like a world away from the bustling city, which doesn't even see the beach as the big bay is surrounded by lush green, gently weary mountains of Koko Head. The bay is secluded and guiet early in the morning, but during the day it becomes a popular place for locals and visitors.
