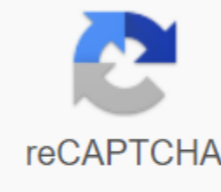

Cultural norms are defined as standard or acceptable behaviors and attitudes espoused by groups of people, such as the citizens of the country, faculty in schools or tribes. Cultural norms affect virtually every part of every daily life and often become routine, where participants are unaware of their specific behaviors and actions. Cultural norms are found in all societies, but differ among different groups and populations. For example, in high school, many students identify with a certain group of friends. Those groups have their own standards of behavior, including patterns of dress and attitudes that group members must adopt to fit in, some groups adopt and promote positive behavior, but cultural norms may include participation in deviant activities such as cigarettes, cigarettes and alcohol use. Cultural norms are sometimes passed on by friends, but also in family and religion.

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
