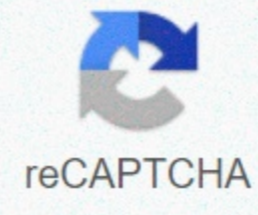




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## Fdny exam 2017 results

The New York City Fire Department is an essential part of the city and is among some of the most diverse departments by female representation and POC. The FDNY exam is conducted every 4 years, and has a high turnout. The last session of the exam, conducted in 2017, witnessed a record turnout of candidates. A total of 46,305 people appeared on the exam, among whom 56% were people of color and 4,000+ were women. FDNY – FDNY tasks and obligations must respond in a timely way to all fire-related emergencies and any other emergencies that should require their skills and abilities. Some of these duties include: Firefighting Technical Rescue Facing chemical and biological threats that save people in distress Promoting fire safety The FDNY also offers resources to candidates who want to join the force, as well as allowing them to contact a recruiter. Given how susceptible the city is to wildfires, FDNY recruits must be physically and mentally able to deal with unprecedented and potentially life-threatening situations. Requirements: Requests to become a firefighter in NYC range from academic to military with basic requirements such as age and residency. Here is the complete list of requirements: Age: According to the NYC Department of Fire, applicants must be above 17.5 and under 29 at the time you start filling out the application form. However, there are exceptions to this. For people on the fire test Special military list: You can be in a maximum of 35 years when you start filling out the application form. For persons on active military duty: Time spent on active military duty should be subtracted from your age at the time of fulfilling the requirements. At most, six years can be taken away. That goes for the people on the special army list. Section 243 of New York State Military Law dictates that. Basic requirements: There is no gender restriction: both men and women can sit the exam. In 2017 for the exam appeared 4,181 women You must pass the computer-generated test You must pass the physical test You must be a U.S. citizen When the appointment time arrives, you must be 21 years or more If you are an immigrant, you will need to provide proof of your identity under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986. Pass medical tests, including a drug test and psychological test Pass the background test as proof of your good character Speak and understand English own an NYS driver's license Live in any of the 5 NYC neighborhoods or in Westchester, Nassau, Suffolk, Orange, Rockland or Putnam County. Academic requirements: You must have a 4-year high school diploma or equivalent qualification of 15 semester college credits are at the very least a requirement of an accredited university or college Requirements for people Army You must serve full time in the military along with honorable discharge experience You must have served full-time as a paid employee for 6 months Additional requirements Once you have completed multiple tests and conducted, you will be on your way to becoming a certified first responder with a certificate of defibrillation (CFR-D)– this is a required completion within the probationary period with the FDNY. The New York Fire Department provides full CRF-D training involved in their firefighting training. The cost of this training course is covered after you have completed your training and obtained a payment period certificate. \$30 from each period is deducted until the amount recovers. Please note that applicants who have not obtained a CFR-D certificate at the end of the probationary period are terminated. The FDNY exam is divided into two parts, among which the first one is written. The written exam is actually computer-based and must be completed within 4 hours. The exam includes understanding-based questions (reading paragraphs and answering) or watching videos and answering questions. Grammar, mathematics, logical reasoning, vocabulary, memory and more are evaluated in this test. This largely test based on multiple choice issues revolves around problem solving. The test is long and important because it is the first step in the FDNY recruitment process. You must pass this test before you can move on to physical and medical tests - therefore, no matter how physically capable the candidate is, all successful will have to pass the written exam first and foremost. The second stage is a test of the physical fitness of the candidate, after you pass the written one. This test consists of 8 events, which are: Stair climbing hose traction carrying equipment Erection ladder and extension Entry forced in search of punching or pulling ceilings All candidates can take up to 2 CPAT orientations offered by the FDNY, 8 weeks before your scheduled exam. Experienced trainers will guide you and you will get equipment to use. A month before the CPAT, candidates are allowed to do two exercises. You must complete this test in 10 minutes and 20 seconds. All events have breaks of 20 seconds in between, and are conducted in sequential order. Keep in mind that all candidates are required to wear at least £50 during the test - this is done to mimic a firefighter's suit and equipment. Make sure you wear long trousers and durable footwear when going to test. The FDNY will provide hard hats and gloves for standard safety. Upon passing the written test, successful candidates will have scheduled interviews with FDNY officers. Depending on how well the candidates have performed, their names are placed on the civil service list (available until here), after which they are referenced to the CPAT. CPAT is psychological and medical examination. Based on the order of their numbers on the list, candidates will be hired by the FDNY over a period of 4 years. The salary for the firefighter starts at \$39,370, a year with \$3,700+ extra pay for overtime and compensation. After completing a 5-year period, an NYC firefighter can earn about \$100,000 a year, including vacation pay and overtime pay. Some FAQs I see from other threads (all other exam topics will be locked, so ask questions here):-Thumb rule, grade 99 or higher is considered likely to be hired. The high 98 is commonly called the end-of-life list. It all depends on the number of people who visit the test, the number of people who perform well, the number of people taking jobs, the number of people repeating academies, etc. - There are usually about 320 people per class. If you have a census number of less than 1,000, you'll probably be immediately invited to start the next step of the recruitment process. If you are more than 1000, your wait will depend on how high your number of lists is.- The longer it is in the life of the census, the greater the number of people the city will have to process to get a class of 320 as more people take different jobs, move away, have families, etc.- The next step of the recruitment process will be physical examination, i.e. CPAT. Here is a video of what CPAT entails.- After physical, you will be assigned an investigator who will do a background check and can guide you through the next step of the process.- People get a score over 100 by getting a high enough test score (up to 100) and then having points added for residency or being a veteran. If you reside in a city that meets a job requirement, have served in the military or are eligible for other loans such as a senior family member's LODD, and you have not added it for a final grade, contact your recruiting or DCAS. Be patient - there are hundreds of people who are calling them right now to ask/complain about their score or census number. Page 2 November 13, 2017 Fire Commissioner Daniel A. Nigro announced today a record number of people taking the recent firefighting exam (46,305) and - for the first time ever - people of color made up the majority of respondents (26,018, or 56 percent). Also, more women took the test than ever before (4,181) – more than double the 2012 exam (1,948). Our unprecedented recruitment campaign has managed to attract interest in a firefighting career from more young men and girls than ever before, according to Fire Commissioner Nigro. And our goal to expand and further diversify the pool of applicants by attracting more women and people of color has also achieved record success. (A computer test was administered to applicants during September and October at multiple test sites across the city.) city.)
