(KYMA, KECY)-The Imperial Valley Fairgrounds will reopen its doors to the public, but this time the site will serve as a community testing ground for coronavirus. Tuesday morning OptumServe will begin testing residents for the coronavirus. The federal health agency has teamed up with California to increase testing across the state. The rollout is part of California Governor Newsom's plan to add 80 test sites in rural and underserved communities like Imperial County. The number of tests when they complete it is 132 tests per day and the lead time is typically two to three days, said Sot Dr. Stephen Munday, ICPHD health officer. The tests will only be carried out by agreement. Those who wish to be tested must register online on the Agency's website. The Imperial County Health Department says priority tests are given to medical staff and those at higher risk, but the purpose of the site is to test a high number of people. There's no one who's going to stand there and say you can go in and you can't, they book these things online. The intention is that this is broad-based and open to the community so that we can test as many people as possible, Munday said. Munday says the health board's lab is now also testing patients. Our health lab is set up to be tested here in Imperial County. The way the machine is set up, they can perform 24 tests at a time, and then it takes a few hours for the test to run, Munday said. The health board has the capacity to test 75 people per day. With the Health Department and OptumServe, which carry out daily tests, more than 200 people in the county can be tested daily Local hospitals and clinics are also conducting additional coronavirus testing in the county. Dr Munday says positive cases in the valley will increase with the increased testing, but he says the data collected will help our health board track where the virus is and in return help to stop its spread. IMPERIAL — On a cloudy afternoon, a lone firefighter and a local supporter climbed through rows of empty stairs and grandstands at the Imperial Valley Fairgrounds on Thursday, September 10 El Centro firefighter Mathew Zinn and event coordinator Tiffnie Macias paid their respects by hoisting it up and down the grandstand in memory of those who died in New York City on September 11, 2001. The 2020 Imperial Valley Virtual 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb was a way for the community to commemorate the 343 firefighters who made the ultimate sacrifice on September 11, 2000, after the event flyer. The event is held annually nationwide with various cities participating through the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, according to its website. Roman Flores Although the event is practically held this year due to the pandemic, participants can enjoy their own ascents at any time between September 11 and September 31. But on September 11 or 12, they are urged to start either at 8:46 a.m. or 10:28 a.m., according to the flyer. The North Tower of the World Trade Center was attacked at 8:46 a.m. and later collapsed at 10:28 a.m., according to the participants, [timeline.911memorial.org](https://www.911memorial.org).By paid the registration fee of 20 to 25 U.S. dollars, the funds will benefit the Programs of New York City Fire. Benefit. Counseling Services Unit and the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation programs supporting the families of the nation's fallen firefighters. Macias said that because the grandstand is not open to the public because of COVID, those interested can take their 1,980 steps - the equivalent of the 110 floors of the World Trade Center staircase - in different ways. We're asking people to just do it on their own - if they want to hike, go for a walk - everyone just does their own thing, but they want to represent the 343 firefighters, she said. You can do it on your own – everything that is 9.11 kilometers – from today until the end of the year. Really, where the heart of this lie comes together for one thing, right? Well, we can't get together (because of the pandemic), said Zinn, who was wearing his firefighting gear. Zinn and Macias, the seventh episode of this 9/11 monument in the valley, said the monument had the highest number of visitors in the history of the valley in 2019, with 380 registered firefighters and all 343 firefighters who had died in the stairwell. Roman Flores In recent years, they said, the event had a large exhibition, complete with fire trucks whose ladders held large U.S. flags, and a photo memorial of all 343 fallen, with profiles of each. This was done in the hope that every firefighter in the stairs would be represented by the Valley community, Macias said. Maybe next year, when we can all gather here (at the fairgrounds) and make another big event, he said. It is important to keep these things going so that we don't forget where we came from, where we were and where we were going. The 9/11 memorial is also important for Macias, she said, noting that it is one of her birthdays that she will never forget. It's how important to me because it was like the worst birthday ever, she said. Even my children remember it; they were small at the time, but they still remember that day because I was upset about it. I just think it's important to never forget this day, especially how the times are right now with everything going on in the world, we don't want to forget what happened that day, she said. Zinn said it was still important to remember what happened during the terrorist attacks and the day people died. Roman Flores Zinn was an officer in the U.S. Army 19 years ago, stationed at Fort Bragg in Carolina, he said. He remembers running his last errands at a bank that day when he saw the second tower of the World Trade Center fall as he prepared to return to the valley for a short vacation before being sent to Korea. Although he paid his respects on September 10 for working on The 11th, fire crews across California are battling major wildfires and putting their lives at risk. At the future 9/11 memorial events at the fairgrounds, Macias said she hoped visitor numbers would increase again, as the plan before the pandemic shutdowns was to open the event not only to represent the 343 firefighters, but also the police and other first responders who lost their lives in the terror attack. We just want people to know that you can still sign up, Macias said. You can go for a walk, go on a hike, do what you want just to represent (the fallen firefighters and first responders). I think it's always important (to commemorate the 11th day), she said. Said.
