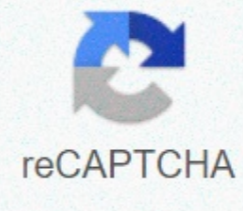

The Kelly School, founded in 1899 in Tritown840 students, was founded in 1899 by Mrs Caleb Brewster Hkelley, a Unitary leader who dedicated the estate where she is in the summer to start the school. The school was originally a boarding school for boys from a wide range of economic, ethnic and religious backgrounds. In 1970, the school became a partner, and from 1970 to 1972 added a K-4 program. The boarding program is now a five-day plan. The school, which has now enrolled 840 K-12 students, has a rigorous academic program in 62 sports teams, building on the school's tradition of having an early football team. The school has always valued the community and the power of friendship. The school's mission is written as follows: Kelly challenges students to grow in character, scholarship and achievement, offer unreserved effort, and learn from the different perspectives and backgrounds in our community and world. Students tended to get a good grade on advanced placement exams (AP), and the middle 50% of the last senior class ranged from 1280-1460 in the math and critical reading sections of the SATs (out of a possible 1600). According to the director, diversity is fundamental to our understanding of what a good education is and one of the hallmarks of our community culture. Established in 1877 a location in Bear Ferry588 students, classes 5-12 located in Ferry Dobbs, 48 km from New York, Masters School was founded in 1877 by Eliza Bailey Masters, who wanted her students, who were girls, to have a serious classical education and not just the education provided by typical finishers As a result, the girls at the school studied Latin and mathematics, and as a century later, the curriculum became a preparatory program at a college in nature. The school attracted boarding school students from all over the country. In 1996, the school became a partner in the upper school, and a boys-only middle school was created to coexist alongside an all-girls middle school. The upper school also began using harkness tables in oval form and the discussion-based teaching style, which originated at Phillips Exeter Academy. The school also began the CITY Semester, a semester program that uses New York as a learning lab. The school has now enrolled 588 students from the 5th grade (boarding school and day) and recently built a new science and technology center. 25% of students receive financial assistance. The school's mission reads: The graduate school provides a challenging academic environment that encourages critical, creative and independent thought habits and a lifelong passion for learning. The Masters School promotes and celebrates academic achievement, artistic development, artistic action, athletic endeavor and personal growth. The school maintains a diverse community that encourages students to actively participate in decisions that affect their lives and develop an appreciation for their responsibility to the big world. Founded in 1869 and surrounded by Rye850 students, the PK-12 RCDS grades were founded in 1869 when local parents invited a teacher named the Rev. William Life and his wife, Susan, to ray to educate their daughters. The school opened as a rye women's seminary, and began concentrating on preparing girls for college. In 1921, the school merged with the rural Rye School of all boys to establish the school for watchman day. The school currently has 850 students in grades 1-12. 14% of its students receive financial assistance. The school's mission reads as follows: Rye Land Day School is an education school, dedicated to providing students from kindergarten to 12th grade with excellent education using traditional and innovative approaches. In a nurturing and supportive environment, we offer a challenging program that inspires people to reach their maximum potential through academic, athletic, creative and social efforts. We are actively committed to diversity. We expect and promote moral responsibility, and strive to develop character power within a respected school community. Our goal is to foster a lifelong passion for learning, understanding and service in an ever-changing world. Established in 1916 located in Mount Kisko (Lower School Campus)Located in Bedford (Middle School Campus)521 students, PK-9 Rippowam Classes was founded in 1916 as Rippoam School for Girls. In the early 1920s, the school became a partner, later merging with more Chesquaw School in 1972. The school currently has an average of 18 students, and a faculty ratio per student of 1:5. Many of the school's adults attend the upper school and local schools. The school's mission reads as follows: The mission of the Ripawa Chiswa School is to educate students to be independent hove, confident in their abilities and themselves. We are committed to a dynamic program of academics, arts and athletics, and support an engaged faculty to challenge students to fully discover and explore their talents. Honesty, consideration and respect for others are fundamental to Ripowam Cisqua. In an atmosphere that promotes intellectual curiosity and a lifelong love of learning, Ripawa Chiswa strives to instill in students a strong sense of connection to their community and the larger world. We, as schoolboys, recognize the common humanity of all people and teach understanding and respect for our differences.

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
