Next, I think the focus on health education depends on the grade level you teach and what topics you're teaching. I think we need to advocate for change. The only issue advocating change is student readiness for change. For example, if students don't think what they're doing is wrong, I think it will be combined with their previous philosophy, even though they're prepared to at least hear the message, think about it, and eventually change their behavior. An example of this is teaching middle school health education and talking about personal hygiene if some students may not think deodorant is necessary to use at this point in their lives, while others have been using it for a while. I think giving a reason to present this will reinforce the positive behavior of students who already use deodorant and bring light to this topic for those who do not. This can help students' physical, social, emotional, and mental wellbeing by making this topic less taboo and opening up more comfort to students' hygiene and cleanliness. Finally, I believe that the success of a health education can be defined by both choices that students combine with this. By providing students with resources to make the right choices and make decisions about their behavior, they not only correct actions that may not do their best, but also strengthen the right decisions and thoughts, and then think about their health. It's successful. As long as you give your students all the resources they need and try to best solve problems and answer any guestions they may have, the rest is up to them, and I think they've had success as a health educator when they see some changes in their already established thoughts, or when they see improvements in their already established thoughts and behaviors. If not, you need to change something in the curriculum. You can't turn every student into an ideal person, but you can definitely provide everything you can to try to change every student. Ultimately, the decision depends on the students, and how open they are to these changes.
