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The tree of knowledge of good and evil and the tree of life

Given that mankind cannot exist but within an allied relationship with God, and all covenants use symbols to give us the hesitation of His grace, he gives the tree, not because he can give man the life with which he was once arranged, but for it to be a symbol and monument of life he received from God. God often uses symbols - he doesn't pass his power on to these outward signs, but by them he stretches his hand to us, because, without assistance, we can't outdo him. That's why he means that man, as often as he eats the fruit, to remember the source of his life, and to recognize that he lives not by his own power, but by god's kindness. Calvin denies (Contra Aguinas and without mentioning his name) that the tree was used as a biological defense against physical aging.
