The feature was discovered by XDA-Developers during a recent removal of the Google Maps 10.31.0 beta app APK. There is no indication as to when the function can be started or whether it will be area-specific when it does. Google Maps is, without a doubt, the most popular app to find your way into this great world. Over the years, it has grown from a simple navigation tool to an app that can also recommend restaurants, prevent you from getting fast tickets, or even keep you safe when taking a taxi. Now, thanks to the guys at XDA-Developers, we're learning that Google is working on another way to keep you safe when you use Google Maps. For example, it will be able to show you which streets have good lighting, poor or no lighting, or if no lighting information is available. There is also an indication that it will be able to show you how illuminated the streets are. Unfortunately, we don't have screenshots of the new level of lighting in action. In addition, we do not know when it will launch or whether it will be specific to the region. No matter where it's launched, it'll be a welcome addition to the all-in-one navigation app. Traveling to new areas can be quite nerve-racking, let alone trying to do it in the dark. But soon the Kirklands got their happy ending. After many trial and error and doing what they consider every mistake in the book, they hit the gold of the soft-pretzel recipe. Then, their former super told them that a space that had last been used as a takeaway restaurant was for rent in Brooklyn's Crown Heights neighborhood -- and still equipped. The moral of the story: Give your super a coffee when he gets to make repairs and tip generously during the holidays!, says Leon. As soon as they opened for business in 2012, the neighborhood knew this wasn't new York's average soft pretzel, and they started showing up for decidedly different flavors like Cran-Mary (cranberry, rosemary, and lemon zest) and their top seller, the Everything, with onion, garlic, and sesame seeds and poppy. That summer, Pelzer's Pretzels landed a spot in Smorgasburg, the popular destination for top artisan food vendors. It was the biggest advertisement we could ever ask for, and from that flowed our first corporate catering orders, says Leon. Thanks to the website, catering is now the main staple of the business. Yet Barella attributes another factor to their success. New Yorkers love to feel safe, so customers cheerfully talk about us, says the former beauty industry marketer. They are very proud to present our products their network. The initial success meant serious time management for the couple. Stretcher performs daily operations. While everyone loves to beat on Apple Maps - and not without justification - none of the existing map apps are still good enough. Whether it's data quality or user experience, everyone gets it too often to be acceptable, and that has to change. Apple, for all its data aggregation, cleaning and sanitization issues, gets a couple of things right. The interface, both pre- and post-iOS 7 is not only beautiful, but a good amount of information not only about your next turn, but the next round. Voice directions a good job of keeping you informed on long stretches of road and advise you to stay left or bring right so you're in the right place for a shift sooner rather than too late. Unfortunately, while Apple Maps can often take you to the block you're going, it tends to break when it comes to the exact place and entry to it. Google Maps nails data, but almost for a fault. It's less human. It will tell you that you have to turn right without warning you to go right, or tell yourself to go left when there are three options on the left and get to processing only well after the correct one has passed. (And not to think their data is perfect, today they told me to do a U-turn on a non-exit road when I was actually in the middle of a 4-lane highway. He only appeared after overcoming the virtual dead end. On my way to Mountain View. Yes.) Nokia Here map, TomTom and all those who licensed data from them all need to do a better job not only with such data, but with presentation in a more humane way. Well verified and constantly presented location that not only tells you where to turn and how to get where, but makes sure you're in the right place to shoot and helps you get there. Like too many things, if I could somehow crush Apple and Google Maps together, I would have something that comes close to what I want - great data and great interface - but this is an option that no longer exists. For now it's a race to see who can become more like each other, better, faster. Maps are difficult, no doubt. But getting lost sucks. What is a reasonable level of accuracy? What is a reasonable level of experience? If you lose a shift or they send you the wrong way, how often is it too often? Often?
