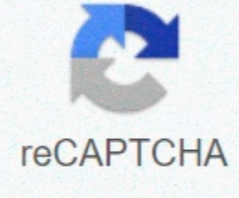

One in five children have certain types of learning disabilities, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). Learning disabilities is a broad term that can include many disorders. It is defined by the National Center for Learning Disabilities as a disorder that interferes with a person's ability to store, process, or produce information, and creates a gap between a person's ability and performance. Children with learning disabilities may suffer from speech, language, reading, math, concentration or reasoning problems. In many cases, the cause of learning disabilities is not known. Experts believe that the learning difficulties that come with this disability are not the result of how the child receives information - the child's vision and hearing are fine - but the result of how the brain handles information. Recent scans have actually shown differences in children's brains having learning difficulties. Certain types of learning disabilities, such as short-reading syndrome, may be inherited. Learning disabilities are not the same as mental retardations, autism, deafness, blindness, or behavior disorders. Children with learning disabilities often have average or above average intelligence.
