Their eyes Are Watching God arguably the best work of Zora Neale Hurston. Originally published in 1937, the novel is a glimpse into Black life in the early years of the 20th century. The book follows the life of Janie Crawford and the development of Eatonville, Fla. Eatonville is a real city and, as in the novel, became the first self-administering city of African-Americans in the United States in the late 1800s. Hurston, 1891-1960, grew up in Eatonville. The novel opens with Janie, a middle-aged African-American woman walking back to Eatonville alone after leaving town with a younger man earlier some hours earlier. He looks like he has been to the end of the world and back and the cities are watching back from the front porch they are looking forward to finding out what happened.
