However, when it enters first, she starts to feel too much, as if the house itself is watching her, waiting, biding her time. . . . My thoughts: Gillian Flynn is probably best known for the book Gone Girl, in which I really enjoyed it, so I was thrilled to read this short story until..... I started reading Dark Places, and I didn't finish it. This caused The Adult to sit on my ediles for quite a long time, when I was worried about which side of the fence I was going to end up on, but unfortunately after reading yesterday, I'm still on the fence... Not because I didn't like it, I absolutely liked it! I enjoyed the humour of the main protagonist, who must renounce the profession of manual labour expert – her words not mine, because of the work she puts on her wrist, now she has turned her hand (metaphorically) to being a psychic. He spends more time in Carterhook, when he and Susan and her stepson Miles are more interested in asking if the house is really haunting or whether it's the residents who are evil. It's basically a secret to who to trust – a woman who makes a living from deception must now find out if she is being deceived, amused and read quickly. My question lies at the end, now I'm often a fan of the open end [when it's done properly], I like that the book stays in my mind when I weigh the information and decide who to believe, but here, the end is nothing but frustrating me. As a short story, I don't feel like they've given me enough information to make a decision, and that leaves me feeling that the story is unfinished. I know what Flynn did with the end, but I think he'd like more clues as to where the conspiracy would go if it was a complete novel. But in general, if you can get your hands on a copy, on just under 70 pages, why not read and see if your thoughts match mine.
