


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Ginkgo biloba memory costco

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On Thursday, U.S. District Judge Cathy Ann Bencivengo certified a California plaintiff who represents consumers who bought TruNature Ginkgo Biloba with Vinpocetine. The product is manufactured by defendant NBTY and sold in the defendant Costco's stores. Judge Bencivengo noted that the plaintiff, Tatiana Korolshteyn, raises questions common to the entire proposed class, with class-wide questions about those unique to individual class members. The question of whether TruNature Ginkgo Biloba offers benefits and whether the statements on the product's label are material are the same for the entire class, the judge said. The judge rejected Costco's challenge to Korolshteyn's ability to represent the class. Costco cited a Facebook conversation between Korolshteyn and her boyfriend that allegedly showed that she was told Ginkgo Biloba was worthless before she actually took the supplement. But Judge Bencivengo found that evidence did not undermine Korolshteyn's credibility in a way that made her an inadequate representative plaintiff. The judge said both the Facebook conversation and Korolshteyn's deposition statement were consistent with her theory that consumer protections were consumer-related statements by the defendants if they chose to buy TruNature Ginkgo Biloba with Vinpocetine. In the same order, Judge Bencivengo rejected requests from both parties seeking to exclude each other's statements and testimonies, and found that the question of admissibility was not germane to the question of class certification. Korolshteyn filed this Costco TruNature Ginkgo Biloba class action in December 2014. You Statements by Costco and NBTY about the health benefits associated with TruNature Ginkgo Biloba Extract are false and misleading. Korolshteyn says that the label for TruNature Ginkgo Biloba promises improved mental function, which run contrary to scientific evidence. The label reportedly says TruNature TruNature Biloba promotes blood flow to the brain, improving alertness, memory, and mental clarity. But according to Korolshteyn, scientific studies show neither Ginkgo biloba nor Vinpocetine offer such benefits. Still, Korolshteyn says she and the members of the class reasonably relied on these statements when they bought TruNature Ginkgo Biloba. It alleges that the statements violate California's Unfair Competition and Consumer Protection Act. Judge Bencivengo rejected some of Korolshteyn's claims in September 2016. The judge ruled Korolshteyn does not have the possibility to pursue injunctions because she is not in danger of being harmed in a future-like manner. Korolshteyn returned with an amended complaint that limited her proposed class to California residents. As judge Bencivengo certifies, the plaintiff class will represent all California consumers who have iced TruNature Ginkgo Biloba with Vinpocetine from the beginning of the applicable legal statute of limitations to the date on which the notice is sent to the members of the class. Korolshteyn will act as a class representative. It shall seek the grant of actual, statutory and criminal damages, reimbursement and compensation for the associated income, and reimbursement of legal costs and legal fees.
