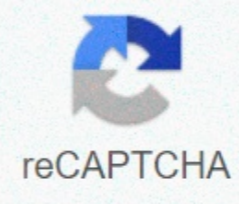

Putting the box on the table through the kitchen window is an ambiguous phrase. This could mean one of the following: Put the box on the table that is out the window in the kitchen. Take the box that is on the table and put it out the window in the kitchen. Remove the box from the table that is near the window and put it in the kitchen. To understand the first and third meanings, it may be useful to imagine that in the kitchen there are two tables: one near the window and another not. And her strength was gone. - The Awakening, Kate Chopin This is a good example of syntactic ambiguity. The whole passage leads readers to wonder if she committed suicide or if she was simply swept away by the current. Like puns and humour, ambiguity lends itself as well to poetry. Click to download the free example Version Download sample Ambiguity (pronounced am-b-gy-t) is a word, phrase, phrase or even a scenario that expresses an idea or situation that has more than one meaning. Also known as error this literary device occurs when the content or structure of a statement renders its meaning inconclusive since it is open to multiple possible interpretations. It should not be confused with vagueness — an idea is vague if it lacks precision, precision, or detail, but it is ambiguous if it is open to various interpretations. Ambiguity occurs in many types, but the most common are: Semantics (polysemy) — ambiguous words, e.g. play, pause, bat, etc. Syntactic (amphiboly or amphibology) — ambiguous sentence structure, for example The murderer killed the student with a book. Narrative — ambiguous character or plot of history/Risques and functions/Sins, ambiguity is present because an individual has poor communication or writing skills. Non-fiction compositions with ambiguous components, for example, are often considered to be below standard since effective writing requires clarity as one of its foundations. However, it is important to note that ambiguity can also be a powerful tool in adding flavor to his literary works. In poetry and storytelling, for example, ambiguity can be used to add a punch of suspense or mystery to the story and make readers think. Although subject to misinterpretation, ambiguity is also used by celebrities to inject humor. A popular example is The Tonight Show with Jay Leno's Headlines segment, in which newspaper headlines with funny errors and ambiguous meanings are presented to make the audience stop, meditate and laugh. Here are some examples and their double meanings: Ribbon cutting for the breastfeeding room/The room does breastfeeding. The room is designed to breastfeed moms. Children make nutritious snacks/Children, when cooked properly, can prepare nutritious snacks. The kinds know how to prepare nutritious snacks. Ambiguity is also present in everyday conversations and real-life situations, which can often lead not only to confusion, but also eventually to frustration. In a workplace, for example, it can be difficult to interpret incomplete guidelines or a delegation of tasks. Sudden and significant changes in an unstable work environment can also catch someone off guard and resort to impulsive decisions. Overall, the most obvious risk of using ambiguity (deliberately or unintentionally) misinterpretation and its consequences, i.e. frustration, boredom and so on. Ambiguity in the literature A mentioned above, ambiguity can be used as a technique to add colour, flavour, complexity and meaning to a literary work, art or film. It can engage readers, or listeners, and encourage them to think and use their imagination to explore meanings and find answers to ambiguous scenarios. When applied appropriately and creatively, ambiguity can transform a simple, unexciting tale into an interesting and stimulating masterpiece that encourages active public participation, allowing them to discuss ideas later. Some of the most famous literary works using ambiguity as a writing technique include the morally ambiguous character of Hamlet (Shakespeare), conversation conversation the couple of dancers in Hills Like White Elephants (Ernest Hemingway), the secret of Walking in The Beast in the Jungle (Henry James), and the double meaning of the repair wall (Robert Frost), among many others.
