She may not be the next Beethoven, but she may be able to learn math more easily, practice good manners (including patience!), and become a team player. The lessons offer a forum where children can learn to accept and make constructive criticism. Turning negative feedback into positive changes helps build self-esteem, says Register. Group lessons in particular can help children understand that no one, including them or their peers, is perfect, and that everyone has room to improve. Presenting in public is an important skill, whether you become a professional musician or not, says Larew. This skill is easily transferable to public speaking, he adds. And, of course, when the baby is advanced enough, she'll have musical skills that will help her stand out. He introduces children to other cultures. By learning and playing different instruments, children can discover how music plays a critical role in other cultures. Bongos and timbales, for example, can introduce children to African and Cuban-style music.
