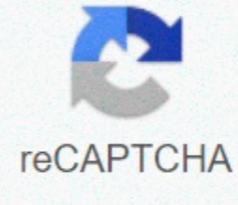




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Alliance to reclaim our schools

The Louisiana Alliance to Require Our Schools (LAROS) is an alliance of parents, students and community and labor organizations fighting to reclaim the promise of public education in Louisiana as the gateway to a strong democracy. LAROS believes that the best way to ensure every child has the opportunity to pursue a rich and productive life is through a system of publicly funded, fair and democratically controlled public schools. LAROS aims to connect parents, students, educators and community members to drive the transformation of public education, shift public debate and build a nationwide movement of equity and opportunity for all. Laros's constant focus is to restore genuine investment in public education through community schools, with the aim of promoting a partnership between the people/services of the neighbourhood's public schools and the community. Community School: A community centre – open all day, every day for all – bringing together academics, health and social services, youth and community development, and community engagement under one roof, leading to better learning, stronger families and healthier communities. A community school is a set of partnerships that bring about a place of study that helps students overcome barriers that cause them to lose their attention and lose hope. What distinguishes these schools is their emphasis on caring for and uplifting the child's different needs (academic, health, nutrition, psychological, etc.) Schools are able to do this in cooperation with several partners and volunteers, from pediatricians and dentists to mentors, and this is all presented on campus. By providing these comprehensive services, community schools strengthen students, support parents and build neighborhoods. Community schools recognize that students cannot focus in the classroom if their basic needs are not met outside the classroom. Students who are hungry, sick, anxious or anxious may be too overwhelmed to learn. With more than 5,000 community schools across the country, their concerns have been acknowledged and resolved. The concept of community school has been embraced by one school, entire school districts, towns and counties; and in one case the whole state (Kentucky). The result has been greater involvement and greater overall academic success. Community schools lead to: lower rates of absenteeism; better work habits, scores, test results and behaviour; increased enrollment in college preparatory classes; and higher tier rates. These schools are often based on the Sustainable Community Schools (SCS) model, which takes into account the needs of pupils and families in the neighbourhood; the services currently provided in school; the availability and capacity of local service providers; and the willingness of school staff to change course and accept a new course of action. Along with these proven strategies, public school districts – especially those that serve black and brown children – have suffered years of divestment and austerity budgets that have deprived them of the opportunities and resources that students must succeed.
