The closures include all buildings, parks, beaches and toilets in the city, as well as a boat ramp. The city made the decision after Gov. Ron DeSantis's executive stay at home order on April 1, effective April 3-30, unless extended; the governor allows cities to be stricter. The city of Clermont is taking these measures out of an abundance of caution to help slow down coronavirus (COVID-19), said Darren Gray, the city manager. This is for the safety and well-being of our population, workers and community, especially to protect those who are most vulnerable - the elderly and people with chronic diseases. The city trails remain open. We encourage our potential residents to continue to remain active while practicing social distance, Mayor Gail Ash said. Essential recreational activities, defined by the governor's order, include fishing, boating, hiking and cycling. All events and programmes in the city premises are cancelled until May 11 and are subject to change as announced earlier. Whenever possible, city services are provided online or by telephone. Utility bills can be paid online; If necessary, checks (without cash) can be thrown into the nest on the south side of the town hall, 685 W. Montrose St. Permits can be placed online. As an alternative, paper applications can be dropped into the trash can on the southern side of the town hall. Checks are completed with photos and videos. Record requests and other requests from the employee's office are processed online. The main city line 352-394-4081 is answered from 8 .m.-17:00.m. Monday to Friday as usual.
