Time to bring 2019 with a bang by checking out some of the latest anime titles Funimation, which include explosive titles and some wonderfully erotic stories that push the boundaries of Eki. If you're interested in anime but haven't watched it yet, or you've been a fan for decades, Funimation definitely has something for you to enjoy. This New Year's choice includes an excellent installment in the children's series Monster Hunter Stories, a couple of swimming sports dramas from the popular Free! The franchise, some super violent and action-packed anime in Juni Taisen and Witch Hunter Robin, and the sexy side of the anime in The New Devil's Covenant Sisters: Explosion, are the censored version. For the uninitiated, Funimation is an American company known for its takes and the internal distribution of Japanese anime. So all the reviews you're going to check out for the dub version of each anime, although some Blu-rays/DVDs have a Japanese audio version as there are some exceptions to the rule. Below you'll find the official synopsis for each movie and series, as well as a link to pick up your own copy in the funimation online store if my review convinces you. Sometimes, it will be an easy thing to suggest you buy it, other times, it will be just as easy to go in the other direction. The following titles from the Funimation New Year's catalog feature an audience of age, young first, so feel free to stop browsing once you hit your limit: Monster Hunter Stories: Ride on - Season 1, Part 4 Monster Hunter Stories: Trip on - Season 1, Part 4 Search for the Last of the Kinship Ore Lute has become a top priority! However, both Dr. Manelger and Cheval continue to cause problems for the group, and as the legend of Redan unfolds, the clouded monsters remain a constant threat. If you're not on a keeping up with these kids friendly adventures, thankfully, there's a repeat of the story so far (or at least the last part of it) to start things in Part 4. The story of a group of children who form a kinship with monsters around the world picks up after the events seen in our previous team Part 3. Monster Hunter Stories: Ride On has super colorful, bright and fun animation, which is a good change from the style that permeates anime for older audiences. In this chapter, there are some tough friendships and kinship lessons learned between Lute and Cheval that are very similar to Naruto and Sask. This comparison is one of the reasons that this series is a great gateway anime beginners and kiddos. And this part of the story comes with several episodes to end this run, including the powerful white dragon and its overshadowed form, Black Horror. There's an intense penultimate episode with some heavy stakes that makes this the best boy and his dragon story, since how to accustom the dragon. It explores a lot of their anxieties and personal issues that affect their performance, but also shows how friendship and support help each other overcome them. Eternal summer is the final chapter in the film trilogy. But this original story, catching up from previous adventures, lacked any interesting drama or conflict even prequel series. It basically follows the swimmers as they're about to start college, but it focuses on more mundane things like finding apartments and navigating some personal issues, complete with dream sequences that add a bit of fantasy to the mix. Apparently the series follows a girl described as eccentric and busty, trying to convince the son of a diner owner to take family business so she could hire her father for her own famous snack company. It's definitely weird enough to be compelling, but it's really all about over-the-top dramatic conversations and predictably pervy and fan-servicey. Maybe season 1 is a little more compelling, but it was a misfire for me. 5/10 Image via FUNimation Concrete Revolutio: The Complete Series of Concrete Revolutio: The Complete Series of The World of Fantastic Creatures, the government has formed a bureau of powerful fighters to protect those with supernatural abilities. But society and government are faced with the definition of justice lines. Past and future weave a web of corruption in this amazing phantasmagoria, where the characters - murderers, beauties - beasts, and even a single member of the bureau has something up his sleeve. This kitchen sink anime goes on a compelling and mysterious start, although it felt like I had already missed something in the first episode. Apparently this is a bit of a spy series with some superhuman abilities and things like aliens and monsters thrown into the mix. I had no idea what was going on, but it was really nice to watch Bones animation stay first class as always. There's a lot going on and it feels like being thrown in the middle of a one-punch man, my academy hero, and Sailor Moon all mixed together with no backstory early on. If you hang in there, however, the backstory ends up kicking in. It's a general idea, although the series is divided between past and future terms, which muddy the water a bit, and also gives a lot of latitude for character development. There are some really unique stories to be found here, especially for different genre stories that can range from toth of all robot battles to classic adventure tales battling monsters of myth in the very next episode. The series get a bit bogged down under its own weight as it adds more and more characters and it never feels cohesive, but it's a super-entertainment watch exactly the same. 7/10 Image via FUNimation a billion million a year 2387, and humanity is at war with the merciless alien species Nosa. There's a fairly typical setup for this 1987 animated series that makes its way west for the first time in its entirety, thanks to Funimation. In the distant humans colonized nearby planets, but alien aliens threatens civilization; A team of three elite fighters (known as the White Nuts/White Knights) each armed with gifted guns known as the Silillion are humanity's only hope, just like you. Protagonist Jj is very similar to the main character of Captain N: Game Master, who arrived 2 years later, and the ladies love to shout his name over and over again. And as a product of its era, there are (of course) fur conversions and red-blue strobes used for dramatic effect; warning of epilepsys! Good thing the music is as happy as it is in this show because the theme song is used quite a bit, almost as much as the different countdown is used to launch missiles and ships or signal an impending explosion. Overall, Million feels a little slow as it's more episodic than serial, but it's a good blast into the past regardless. 6/10 Image via FUNimation Dragon Ball Super: Part 5 Dragon Ball Super: Part 5 After their first encounter with Goku Black, the Cyan trio are itching a dish of some payback! With everyone's life on the line, fighter jets must face the problem first or try to change the timing at the source! It was a blast to watch the Dragon Ball Super story unfold, whether you're watching it in original Japanese audio or Funimation English dub. This section of the story, relating to the second run of our heroes with Goku Black during Episodes 53-65, comes with a hilarious mystery twist thrown in among all the action. The gang needs to find out why blacks have a Time Ring, so they visit a parallel universe to talk to Supreme Kai. If they do not understand the mystery, the future of the Earth may be doomed ... While this arc wasn't quite as good as the Tournament Power Arc that follows it, it was a fun little side trip for the series, and this particular section has some interesting episodes. This sequel to the first part (you can read my review here) is as funny and funny as the first round, but even more self-conscious and fourth wall breaking than before. Part 2 explores Jyugo's backstory somewhat more and still gives others time to shine. Mythology really picks up a few notches here with the organized escape of convict and former guard Enki Gokuu, Samon's older brother. Throughout the story, friends and colleagues betray guards and manipulate prisoners to achieve their own goals. So while he does get get bogged down in what feels like one protracted battle, it's a decent sequel from the first part. Part. and there's a funny extra high school episode, kind of like a killing class that's a bit satirical to take.) 8/10 Image via FUNimation Jin Tama Series 3, Part 2 Gintam Series 3, Part 2 Aliens known as Amanto invaded Earth and took over feudal Japan. If I had gotten into this Odd Anime Work earlier, I'm sure I'd be better acquainted with the quirky cast of characters, but meeting them at the end of the game was a bit jarring. There's a bunch of anime references and lots of lots of jokes and pop culture references throughout, but it feels like a crutch due to the lack of substantial storytelling at times. This show is very silly with a bit of action thrown in, although I love music so much in this stuff. Even arcs like Shogun Killer, which seem like they'll have a little more meat for them end up feeling like a filler. It doesn't really keep my focus at all, but I think it's just a case of landing in the middle of these episodes rather than traveling with them from the beginning. 6/10 Image via FUNimation Pop Team Epic Epic Team Epic Crude, rough, and a little... Cute? Get ready for the larger-than-life attitude of Popuko and Pipimi, the small and high stars of the Epic pop team. It starts as an ordinary anime series, but quickly plunges into crazy thanks to cutesy characters and their raucous voices getting into all sorts of funny situations; It belongs on Adult Swim. It's really not even worth trying to get through the history of Pop Team Epic, because no, not in any obvious or meaningful way, anyway, it's just a bunch of random non sequiturs, one by one, so you'll know very quickly if it's your particular brand of humor or not. He pokes fun at famous manga, artists and fans alike, as well as the anime and its tropes, as well as being completely insane, playing with wild animation styles and casual parties in live action and sometimes in French ... Twelve warriors, each baring a name from the Chinese zodiac, will fight in the bloody battle of the royal. The winner is given one wish, and they will do everything possible to earn it. I like the premise: 12 elite mercenaries fight to the death in the zodiac tournament, which takes place in a city where half a million people were moved overnight, with each participant representing an animal in the Chinese zodiac. It's amazing how a clean and simple premise can really help focus the narrative without getting dragged down by filler or side stories. This series is pretty much total action from the get-go with kinetic and dynamic fight scenes that get mega violent, as you might expect, but also pretty gory. Juni Taisen: The zodiac war does a great job of making you invested in individual characters, only to cut their knees out from under them (sometimes literally) which keeps the audience and other characters on their toes. The win-or-death mentality really up the ante, too. So the ultimate wish of the tournament winner is a little disappointing, this anime series is the winner, hands down. 12/10? Okay, then 10/10. Image via FUNimation Witch Hunter Robin Witch Hunter Robin Seine is a powerful user of the craft compiled by the STNJ-group of specialized hunters who fight deadly creatures known as witches. While her firepower is great, she has a lot to learn about her abilities and work with her cool and side-side partner, Amon. But the truth about the Witches and herself will leave Robin on a completely new path, which she never expected! After a few moments of watching Robin the Witch Hunter, I remembered that I had already seen him, and then immediately got angry with myself for having forgotten him; It is a fantastically animated dark mythology with some clever and unique elements throughout. I don't think I ever got a chance to finish the series when it was on the air, so now is the perfect time to do it. It's not as gory as Juni Taisen or anywhere near as sexed-up as Covenant, but it deals with some more mature themes in its narrative. He also got a cool kind of punk horror feel to him, like a craft or a crow, which is rare but endearing; it was the perfect content for the Midnight Run Cartoon Network. Even the credits sequences on this are awesome, even if they feel exactly the same as the early 2000s sunrise (i.e. Cowboy Bebop, InuYasha, Outlaw Star, Gundam series, etc).
