The series was created by Todd J. Greenwald and plays selena gomez, david henrie, and jake t. austin as three wizard brothers who compete with magical abilities to win sole custody of family powers. It also stars Jennifer Stone, Maria Canals Barrera and David DeLuise. In 2009, the series won the Outstanding Children's Program award for its 61st annual Academy Awards. The film adaptation of the series, Wizards of Waverly Place: The Movie, premiered as the Disney Channel's original film on August 28, 2009. The film's adaptation won the Outstanding Children's Program award at the 62th Annual Academy Awards. The farewell season won outstanding children's program at the 64th Primetime Emmy Awards, giving the franchise a total of three Emmy awards. Wizards of Waverly Place ended 106 episodes over four seasons, surpassing That's So Raven, which has 100 episodes over four seasons. The series finale averaged nearly 10 million viewers (live and full views on the same day), which makes this episode the most watched series finale in Disney Channel history.
