This was controversial after the Civil War, when national unity was particularly important, so state lawmakers required the flag and seal to be twisted to put National Unity on top. Some of the tribes known to have lived in Illinois include the algonquian-speaking people of Kickapoo, Sauk, Fox, Potawatomi, Ottawa, Ojibwa (Chippewa), Kaskaskia, Peoria, Cahokia and Tamaroa. The first Europeans came from France in 1673, but France of British politics in the region, the number of settlers fell to about 1,000, plus several hundred slaves. Chicago became the second largest city in the U.S. in the 1880s. The first atomic chain reaction took place at the University of Chicago in 1942, beginning the atomic era of the country. All the while, however, Illinois has struggled with violence and scandals as a result of bootleg (illegal) alcohol, organized crime under the notorious Al Capone, Ku Klux Klan activities and coal strikes. While the state still has higher rates of violent crime, its cultural growth continues. Chicago has become a center of art, writing and research. There is a rich film history, and the area is known for its theatre, dance, orchestra, opera, jazz and blues. Chicago has also become an architectural leader, and its buildings are becoming role models for the world. Read the Illinois history timeline below to learn the important facts of Illinois history through the events that took place in that state. Come to life history and geography with agricultural areas, forests, wetlands and Hills. The northern, southern and western parts of the state consisted of plains that were covered with tall grasses before the land was used for farmland and cities. The southernmost part of the land known as the Shawnee National Forest. The first settlers goed the state of its wood, leaving only 10 percent of the forest cover. There are hills in the northwest corner of the state, including the highest point on Charles Mound, as well as gently sloping hills in southern Illinois. The soils of northern and central Illinois are excellent for breeding, and about 900 streams flow into the Mississippi River system. The whole state is located on natural underground reservoirs. Due to pollution and decline in forest areas, abundant wildlife that developed in Illinois (i.e. bears, wolves, bison, mountain lions, elk and porcupage) disappeared. The deer went extinct in 1910, but were re-introduced in 1933 and regained their population. Coyotes, foxes, migratory waterfowl and some species of fish can still be found in natural areas and more in urban areas. Check out this Illinois map below and add these items to the map. Illinois borders Wisconsin to the north, lowa to the northwest, Lake Michigan to the northeast, Missouri to the west, Indiana to the east, and Kentucky to the state. Its largest city, Chicago, is located in northeastern Illinois, on the shores of Lake Michigan. The city of Cairo, known as Little Egypt, is located on the southernmost tip of Illinois. The Mississippi River flows along the western border of Illinois. The Mississippi River at the southern end near Cairo. The highest point in Illinois is Charles Mound, a 1,235-foot hill near the small town of Scales Mound, in the northern part of the state. The lowest point in the state is on the Mississippi River (279 feet) in Cairo, on the southern tip of Illinois. How else can you learn funny facts about Illinois?
