August 14, 2017 Courtesy of the El Capitan TheatreAdding a return to classic films on the silver screen every day, the Castro Theatre stands out for a pair of its historic excavations with outdated treasures of cinema history. Built in 1922 in the heart of San Francisco's Castro district, the grand film room combines Spanish, East Asian and Italian design and holds more than 1,400 locations. Surely something else is happening at the Sci-Fi Dine-In Theatre Restaurant at Hollywood Studios Walt Disney World- and it's not just a sci-fi roll movie. This magical feeling comes in the way of a total immersive recreation of the 1950s cinema drive-in, complete with custom car cabins that serve as a dining table. Short clips of strangely transfixing sci-fi classics fade into the background as the real special effect becomes a sense of travel time. Hollywood's golden age persists within the sanctied walls of the El Capitan Theatre, the legendary Los Angeles film house that received a dazzling new lease of life through Walt Disney Studios Motion Pictures. Built by visionary Charles E. Toberman in 1926, theatre at 1100 it only shows Disney movies, with a rotating drum of new releases, mouse classics and premieres. The bonus to each cinema ticket comes through pre-show live entertainment (often thematically for feature presentations), capture a miracle for all signature Disney-style age groups. Thalian Hall is housed in one of the oldest operating theatres in the country. A landmark with a knack for dramatic, its design is a cross of classical revival and late-Vetorian architecture with an ideal tetrastyle façade. It is a center of performing arts in the center, so plan ahead to catch an independent film on the main stage, or opt for one of the film festivals that often theater all year round. Giving new meaning to the return of the old school, Portland, Oregon's Kennedy School is a hotel, brewery and cinema set in a former public elementary school. What was once a space used for school assemblies now lives as a place for second films and classics. Moving from the height of a great upper circus to the size of a proscenium, Albert Ringling tried to recreate France's ornate opera houses as a gift to his tiny hometown of Baraboo, Wisconsin. Built in 1915, the theater has survived for decades, and remarkable renovation efforts are escaping the interiors of masterpieces. Come early to admire the rich columns, the seats in the box and the chandelier. Classic films take place sporadically as part of regular programming of plays in the theater. Kryptonite to any mass-market superhero movie, Film Forum has been a national leader in the presentation of counterculture cinema since its lo-fi beginnings in the 1970s. (Several relocations brought film forum to their current home on Houston Street in New York in 1989.) As the only nonprofit cinema in New York City, movie fans are looking for an intimate place for its three screens, which are curated by exclusive premieres and second glances at faded classics. A cultural haven in Boston's Brookline neighborhood since 1933, Coolidge Corner has a rare distinction of being a constantly operating theater dedicated to independent film. Its well-preserved Art Deco style, along with the classic red curtain, sets the stage for movies you won't find in megaplex. Run as a nonprofit since 1989, the theater has undergone several renovations over the past decade, restoring the operation to historic glory by adding comfortable armchairs, HD projectors and new sound systems. Craft cocktails and avocado toast delivered to the venue midway through the film: A new wave of exclusive videos can be traced to one of the Alamo Drafthouse's signature outposts, the Alamo Drafthouse at the Ritz. Founded in 1997 as a second home Alamo Alamo created a new cinematic experience trading hot dogs and carbonated drinks for artisanal food and craft beers. The operation has achieved rampant success, rapidly expanding to 29 locations across the country.
