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Mrs. white's golden rule cafe

Monday: Tuesday: Wednesday: Thursday: Friday: Saturday: Sunday: Elizabeth White and Larry White, Sr., co-owners of Mrs. White's Golden Rule Cafe, talk about the restaurant's history and its uncertain future. According to Local First Arizona, a nonprofit that celebrates independent businesses throughout Arizona, downtown businesses have seen anywhere from an 80 to 100 percent drop in profits over the past few months. Aware of the need, Suns Charities is coming together with Local First and Devin Booker and is committed to supporting restaurants and food vendors in downtown Phoenix with \$100,000 in funding that will help feed the hungry in our community. As part of the Suns Small Business Assistance program, Mrs. Whites Golden Rule Cafe has received \$5,000 that will underwrite food for those in need. To highlight participating businesses, we connect with Ms. White's granddaughter and restaurant manager Kianna White, who shares more about local coffee shops, partnerships with the Phoenix Suns and giving back to the community. Jefferson St., Phoenix, AZ 85034) recently provided meals for Ryan House, a local nonprofit that provides hospital and palliative care to children and their families through a variety of support programs. Dishing Out Local Love: Mrs. Whites Golden Rule Cafe Can you give a little history of Mrs. Whites? Mrs. White herself moved to Phoenix from Temple, Texas in 1964 with her four children. His brother, Floyd Jimerson, owns a restaurant here called The Church Café that doubles as a church on Sundays. He moved here to help her run that café for the first six months in Phoenix and she did an amazing job running the restaurant, she handed it to him so she could focus more on politics and civil rights advocacy. He took out a \$500 business loan and converted the restaurant into Mrs. White's Golden Rule Café and he was in the original location from 1964 to 1976. We moved in and have been in the same location at 808 Jefferson East for the last 44 years. What drives the passion behind Mrs. Whites Golden Rule Cafe? Our menu and how we made it all was inspired by the way Mrs. White was raised. We stay true to the quality of our food and how we make it. He wanted to bring the same qualities and pure ingredients from his upbringing to the restaurant and that is why taste and consistency were so important to him. She is 97 and still comes to make sure everything is served the right way and the way she was raised. What does it mean for you to be part of downtown Phoenix culture? This is good! When Mrs. White first moved to Phoenix the city was still quite separate on 1960s. My mother told me that back then we as black people didn't go to certain parts of town or be allowed to North of Thomas Road. As part of Downtown Phoenix and since she opened the door to the cafe, Mrs. White has always prided himself on being a restaurant where anyone could eat and that is clearly still true to this day. To be in the city centre where all kinds of people live and work, it means a lot to us to cook and serve and make everyone feel like they're back in their grandmother's kitchen. How important is giving back to the community for Mrs. Whites Golden Rule Cafe and what does it mean for you to work with the Phoenix Suns? We have been part of the community for over 50 years, it is very important for us to be the heartbeat for the community and the pillars of the city. We do not reject anyone, if someone comes hungry, we will feed them. We wouldn't be where we would be if it weren't for the community, so we're always trying to give back to the city that helped our success. We consider ourselves a staple of the Phoenix community, just like the Sun. Phoenix Suns players have been eating at Mrs. Whites since they first became a team in 1968! From Connie Hawkins to Charles Barkley to the newest player on the team, they've all visited and returned to enjoy our meal. It means a lot to us to partner with the Suns and we always appreciate their support, now more than ever. What are your current capabilities and what are the current offers you want to highlight? Our working hours are still the same and we still offer our full menu, but we have switched to take-home and delivery only. We continue to monitor the health situation and will not open the dine-in until it is deemed safe, or as we wish to say: we will not be open until Disneyland does! Why is it important to support local businesses? Wherever we can, we always do it. On a personal level, whenever my father and I hear about new local restaurants in the city we always try to visit and support and to this day we still support other local restaurants and shops. We were local, we ate locally and we shopped locally for everything we could for restaurants of produce, meat and we even used local shops to print our menus and T-shirts. With everything that happens with COVID-19, I make it a point to book take-outs from local businesses as often as I can to help support our community where I can. How has the coronavirus pandemic changed your business model? By the grace of God, we have maintained a steady flow of business, but we have to turn into take-home or delivery only. We are working with Postmates and Door Dash for the first time for a very new delivery for us but it has worked well This. We're just being more careful now and have increased the frequency of cleaning restaurants and making sure everything is cleaned so people feel safe coming to pick up food. What will it take for small businesses to survive this difficult time? Support. It will take support from our community other small businesses. Consistency is also key, and we have been blessed that despite just taking it home, our regular customers remain consistent in our support. The outpouring of business from the community was incredible. I think it's wonderful to see the community rally and support small businesses and keep them afloat during tough times. Inside and outside, it's a throw back, from painted signs to tight wooden booths and lunch counters. Fantasy extends to the menu: Mrs. White's (named after founder Elizabeth White) serves truly timeless Southern food. The writing on the wall - literally - tells you this 50-year-old restaurant is where you'll find one of Southern Phoenix's most famous dishes: golden brown Southern fried chicken (with cabbage sides and black-eyed peas suggested). You'll find other home-style staples here that are relatively rare in Arizona, such as fried catfish (tartar sauce not needed), red beans, and cobblers. Don't worry if you live or work everywhere near a small yellow lunch. Mrs. White has spinoffs everywhere, including her granddaughter, Larry Lo-Lo White's spot, Lo-Lo's Chicken & Waffles.
