## Eden gray tarot pdf

Eden Gray (born June 9, 1901) began his life as Priscilla Partridge, debutant from Chicago and second cousin of Princess Engalitheff, the wife of the Russian vice-adviser. Even in her youth, Priscilla decided to become a stage actress. Although her family owned the Garrick Theatre in Chicago (as well as a large department store), her father snatched her from the spotlight and took a menial job at another department store. It wasn't long before she slipped to New York, where, at the age of 19 and without her parents' knowledge, she married the Chicago poet, novelist and screenwriter Lester Cohen (who wrote the screenplay for *Of Human Bondage*, among others). From 1920 to 1933 she appeared in a number of Broadway plays, including Edith Wharton's *The Age of Innocence*, 1928 at the Empire Theatre in New York (photo right) and *Doctor X* on Broadway (see poster). She also starred in three films, known as Pamela Gordon in the 1925 film *Lovers in Quarantine*, and did not appear with Ronald Reagan in *King's Row* until 1942 (although she had only a glimpse of her at a window in the film, she and Reagan shared an interest in positive thinking and astrology). She and her husband also embarked on a multi-year journey, which he described in his book *Two Worlds: An Account of a Journey around the World*. During World War II, she put her acting career on hold to become a laboratory technician with the Women's Army Corps. After living in Pennsylvania, Virginia, Indiana, Paris and London, and working on radio and the London stage, Gray moved back to New York. She received her doctorate from the First Church of Religious Science and then taught courses in humanities. Gray also met the librarian Gertrude Moakley, who had been researching the origins of Tarot in Renaissance Italy since the early 1950s (see bio by Moakley here). In the late 1950s and 1960s, Eden Gray ran a bookstore and a publishing house called Inspiration House, one of the few places to buy tarot cards and take tarot classes. Her clients complained that the available books were not easy to understand, so she spent weekends in the country to find a more accessible way to approach the maps. Eden Gray published her first book *Tarot Revealed: A Modern Guide to Reading the Tarot Cards* in 1960, to which she applied her New Thought perspective (see my previous post here). She had her first success with two other Tarot books: *A Complete Guide to the Tarot* (1970) and *Mastering the Tarot: Basic Lessons in an Ancient, Mystic Art* (1971). All have prints by their artist son Peter Gray Cohen. These books are continuously printed and are still among the best-selling tarot books. My personal favorite is the mastery of the Tarot, Tarot, Meanings are the richest of the three, and there are practical demonstrations of the interpretation of the maps through sample readings. Lesson 18, The Use and Misuse of the Tarot, is a small gem of the New Thought philosophy and positive thinking applied to the cards. Gray advises: So pay attention to the pitfalls when reading the cards; recognize how much everyone can be suggested – and then go ahead and use the cards forever . . . . Give those for whom you read encouragement to strive for their highest ideals. The seeds you plant can bloom to beautiful flowers of completion. Along with various editions of the Rider-Waite-Smith Deck (de Laurence, University Books, Albano-Waite, Merrimack, U.S. Games, Inc.) Eden Gray's Tarot books were the main impetus for the hippie adoption of Tarot as a spiritual guide to navigation on a world-turned-head that led directly to the booming Tarot Renaissance that began in 1969. It was Eden Gray, to whom we owe the term Fool's Journey, which appears as the title of the epilogue in *A Complete Guide to the Tarot*. She explained: The fool represents the soul of every human being who, after being clothed in a body, appears on earth and goes through the life experiences depicted in the 21 maps of Major Arcana, which are sometimes considered archetypes of the subconscious. Every reader should use his imagination and find here his own map of the search of the soul, because these are symbols that are deep in each of us. In 1960, she had already alluded to the idea, saying that the fool must pass through the experiences suggested in the remaining 21 cards to reach the climax of cosmic consciousness or Divine Wisdom in Map 21 – an idea that resonated deeply with the hippies – and that Gray was probably taken up by A.E. Waite, who wrote about the progress of the soul through the maps. In 1971, Gray moved to Vero Beach, Florida, where she focused on her art and spiritual service. She was a member of the Vero Beach Art Club and the Riverside Theater and Theater Guild. In the 1990s, they contacted several people about their previous work in Tarot, including Ron Decker and Janet Berres of the International Tarot Society. Berres honored Gray with the Tarot Lifetime Achievement Award at her third International Tarot Congress in Chicago in 1997. It was here that Eden Gray was astonished to learn how much she was revered for her groundbreaking Tarot books.
