According to a statement on its website, the Bloomington's branch of Black Lives Matter called for a boycott Wednesday of the Herald-Times and the City-Run farmers market. This story was updated at 3:06 p.m. February 16 After months of protests over farmers market provider Schooner Creek Farm's links to white supremacy groups, business owners announced Friday that they are suing the mayor and park officials. A lawsuit filed in the U.S. District Court accuses the mayor and park officials of violating the constitutional rights of sellers. The lawsuit backs by making public statements supporting protesters at the market, Mayor John Hamilton prevented Schooner Creek Farm owners Sarah Dye and Douglas Mackey's First Amendment rights. The Bloomington branch of Black Lives Matter called for a boycott Wednesday of the Herald-Times and Bloomington Community Farmers' Market , according to a statement on its website. The group urged people to support Eastside Market, a newer, supplier-run market. It is long past for the Bloomingtonians to part with institutions that promote the destruction of marginalized people, the Black Lives Matter B-town statement read. The statement claims that the newspaper and the city supported white supremacy. He criticizes a Herald-Times profile of Sarah Dye, a market seller linked to the American Identity Movement, a white nationalist group. was published February 2 on the front page of the newspaper. The Herald-Times report omitted the voices of activist groups opposed to Dye, Black Lives Matter B-town said in the statement. The group called to cancel their subscriptions and asked advertisers to stop working with the newspaper. Neither the Herald-Times nor the Black Lives Matter B-town responded to requests for comment. The statement also criticised the city's response to Dye's presence at the market. Black Lives Matter B-town condemned the city for refusing to remove Dye and those who have racist or violent beliefs from the farmers' market and instead opting to limit the protesters' speech, according to the statement. Bloomington Mayor John Hamilton and city staff want people to participate in the market, which continues to be run by the city because of recommendations from park and recreation staff, city spokesman Yaël Ksander said in an email. The market contributes to the vitality of Bloomington city centre, Ksander said in email. Ksander said the market contributes to sustainability goals and help provide livelihoods for suppliers. She also said that the city hopes to talk more to Black Lives Matter and other groups to hear suggestions for the 2020 market. Schooner Creek Farm is an accommodation in Oregon. Dana Cole said Thursday morning. Because of similar substances in three of the cases used and in close proximity to all four, the local incidence was attributed to a BPD detective. Vandalism at Schooner Creek Farm is not handled by BPD because the farm is in Brown County, Indiana, but Cole has told BPD plans to cooperate to find out if it is connected as well. The original story Three houses, two cars and a business were vandalized sometime on Tuesday night into Wednesday. in documents that included fake blood, rusty nails and broken into the car. At this time, it is not known who committed these acts or whether they are all connected. Jeremy Hogan, reporter and owner of online news source he said his wife found a blood-like substance outside the door while leaving for work around 8 a.m. It was sprinkled on the porch and wintery welcome mat. I'm not generally someone who has a lot of enemies, Hogan said. Later in the day, what appeared to be the same substance was found in the mailbox. The vandalism of mailboxes, which are considered federal property, can result in a fine of up to \$250,000 or three years in prison, according to the U.S. Postal Service. Jeremy Hogan's mailbox was hit with a balloon filled with a red substance on the night of December 10-11. Hogan said he believes the anti-fascist protesters targeted him, along with Schooner Creek Farm, Professor Eric Rasmusen and others. Ty Vinson Hogan said he believes vandalism is linked to the work he does as a journalist. He said he has had conflicts with activist groups in recent months and believes this could be part of those clashes. To come and do that in someone's house when They're inside, though, that's one of the boldest things I've seen from the protesters, Hogan said. Sarah Dye and Doug Mackey of Schooner Creek Farm in Brown County said they found dozens of rusty nails at the top of their alley Wednesday morning. Sarah Dye and Doug Mackey, owners of Schooner Creek Farm, found dozens of nails in their driveway on the morning of December 11 in Brown County. Vandalism was believed to be linked to several other accounts in Bloomington, including a red substance found in a business and other homes. Ty Vinson Dye said he went to check after Hogan sought to tell him about his own vandalism. We probably would have noticed when we had flat tires, Dye said. Dye and Mackey recently faced criticism for their connection to the white nationalist group American Identity Movement, formerly Identity Evropa. The farm was also targeted last October, Dye said. At that point, they found fake blood in the mailbox with the word fascist spray painted nearby and their American flag torn down. Nails have not yet been lifted by 2p.m on Wednesday. Dye said their neighbor would bring in a magnet to make sure they'd do a thorough job. While scanning over 3.5-inch nails, Mackey said it looked like some were buried under the leaves to make them harder to see. It's certainly just one more incident in a long line of harassment incidents all year, Dye said. Josh Graham, a self-identified conservative and spawner Creek supporter, had his rear windshields smashed into two cars belonging to him and his family. He found two bricks that said Happy Holidays XOXO nearby and thinks they are what they were used to break Stones painted with Happy Holidays XoXo were used to smash the rear windshield of Josh Graham's car on the night of December 10-11. More places including Schooner Schooner The farm, they were vandalized overnight. Ty Vinson Graham said his friends have started a GoFundMe for him because he believes the damage could cost over \$1,000, which is particularly difficult for him with bills paid and Christmas coming up. Probably that's why they did it, because I know you can't afford it, Graham said. Graham said he believes he was hit for his conservative views and support for Schooner Creek. He said he had received threatening messages from unknown numbers since local anti-fascist activists posted his personal information on Facebook in October. According to a Statement from the Bloomington Police Department, Capt. Ryan Pedigo, Professor Eric Rasmusen's front door was hit with a red liquid around 1:45a.m. It was found after the sound of a slow-moving vehicle outside and a knock on the door. Rasmusen could not be reached for comment until the publication. The Women's Care Center, a pregnancy center located near Planned Parenthood, was also targeted with fake blood outside its door that councillors found on their way to work. The centre's director, Michelle Summitt, said the center provides information to women about their pregnancy, including abortion. She said she refers to women's medical care, but not to abortion providers. A 2017 article in the Herald-Times said the center has an anti-abortion message, or affirmation of life, despite its lack of religious affiliation. Despite past incidents, there have been no recent threats that have led her to believe that something imminent will happen to the centre, Summitt said. We haven't really had any negativity lately, Summitt said. Summitt said that the door and porch were quickly cleaned. I just know it's unfortunate, Summitt said. Said.
