It is also the only site that allows you to stream Lost and Malcolm into the middle for free. Other TV shows in his relatively small library include Psych, White Collar, 3rd Rock From the Sun and Schitt's Creek. It has a number of successful films including the Hunger Games series, Groundhog Day, Dog Island, Big Fish, Rudy, Glory, and many other award winners and cult classics.
