## Herodotus The Persian Wars (Godley)/Book IV

At the same Herodotus and the Persian Wars the ships sailed over to the opposite shore. At the same time they determined to send ambassadors to the Argives, and conclude a league with them against the Persians; while they likewise despatched messengers to Gelo, the son of Deinomenes, in Sicily, to the people of Corcyra, and to those of Crete, exhorting them to send help to Greece. According to the Macedonian account, the Phrygians, during the Herodotus and the Persian Wars that they had their abode in Europe and dwelt with them in Macedonia, bore the name of Brigians; but on their removal to Asia they changed their designation at the same time with their dwelling-place. Why will you ever flee? For of all the armaments whereof any mention has reached us, this was by far the greatest; insomuch that no other expedition compared to this seems of any account, neither that which Darius undertook against Herodotus and the Persian Wars Scythians, nor the expedition of the Scythians which the attack of Darius was designed to avengewhen they, being in pursuit of the Cimmerians, fell upon the Median territory, and subdued and held for a time almost the whole of Upper Asia; nor, again, that of the Atridae against Troy, of which we hear in story; nor that of the Mysians and Teucrians, which was still earlier, wherein these nations crossed the Bosphorus into Europe, and, after conquering all Thrace, pressed forward till they came to the Ionian Sea, while southward they reached as far as the river Peneus. And now he saw in the Herodotus and the Persian Wars, as the Persians declare, a vision of this nature - he thought a tall and beautiful man stood over him and said, "Hast thou then changed thy mind, Persian, and wilt thou not lead forth thy host against the Greeks, after commanding the Persians to gather together their levies? He, when he had made an end of digging the canal which leads from the Nile to the Arabian Gulf, sent Phoenicians in ships, charging them to sail on their return voyage past the Pillars of Heracles till they should come into the northern sea and so to Egypt. Want has at all times been a fellow-dweller with us in our land, while Valour is an ally whom we have gained by dint of wisdom and strict laws. This invention they have made in a land which suits their purpose and has rivers which are their allies; for their country is level and grassy and well watered and rivers run through it not much less in number than the canals of Egypt. In front of the king went first a thousand horsemen, picked men of the Persian nation - then spearmen a thousand, likewise chosen troops, with their spearheads pointing towards the ground - next ten of the sacred horses called Nisaean, all daintily caparisoned. The youth went away and told his Herodotus and the Persian Wars and the next day he came himself with another to the place, where he found the Amazon and another with her awaiting him. But as for Herodotus and the Persian Wars, no Herodotus and the Persian Wars have any knowledge whether it be surrounded or not by seas, nor whence it took its name, nor is it clear who gave the name, unless we are to say that the land took its name from the Tyrian Europa, having been as it would seem till then nameless like the others. If things go well for the king, as thou sayest they will, let me and my children be put to death; but if they fall out as I prophesy, let thy children suffer, and thyself too, if thou shalt come back alive. If you will not do this, then shall we either be driven perforce out of our country, or abide and make terms. Consider that I have not yet reached to the full growth of my wisdom, and that they Herodotus and the Persian Wars urge me to engage in this war leave me not to myself for a moment. These Medes were called anciently by all people Arians; but when Media, the Colchian, came Herodotus and the Persian Wars them from Athens, they changed their name. These travels would have taken many years. These heads, they say, are set aloft to guard the whole house. Besides, they will leave behind them in our country their wives, their children, and their properties - can it then be conceived that they will attempt rebellion? The Scythians attacked in this fashion by night as well as by day. As many of them as are famous and can be entered from the sea, these I will name. Then he scrapes out the flesh with the rib of an ox, and kneads the skin with his hands, and having made it supple he keeps it for a napkin, fastening it to the bridle of the horse which he himself rides, and taking pride in it; for he is judged the best man who has most scalps for napkins. This was the plan of the Scythians, for they desired that children should be born of the women. Here was the royal fort which is likewise called Doriscus, where Darius had maintained a Persian garrison ever since the time when he attacked the Scythians. Here, upon this isthmus where Athos ends, is Sand, a Greek city. Harvard University Press, Moreover, it is clearly seen that the Cimmerians in their flight from the Herodotus and the Persian Wars into Asia did also make a colony on the peninsula where now the Greek city of Sinope has been founded; and it is manifest that the Scythians pursued after them and Herodotus and the Persian Wars Media, missing their way; for the Cimmerians ever fled by the way of the coast, and the Scythians pursued with the Caucasus on their right till

For this thing, be it what it may, that visits thee in thy sleep, surely is not so far gone in folly as to see me, and because I am dressed in thy clothes, straightway to mistake me for thee. After the ten sacred horses came the holy chariot of Jupiter, drawn by eight milk-white steeds, with the charioteer on foot behind them holding the reins; for no mortal is ever allowed to mount into the car. Cleopatra VII ruled ancient Egypt as coregent first with her father, then with her two younger brothers and finally with her son for almost three decades. When this business was concluded, understanding that Xerxes had reached Sardis with his army, they resolved to despatch spies into Asia to take note of the king's affairs. Thou seest to how great a height the power of Persia has now reached - never would it have grown to this point if they who sate upon the throne before me had been like-minded with thee, or even, though not like-minded, had listened to councillors of such a spirit. She ruled over the Halicarnassians, the men of Cos, of Nisyrus, and of Calydna; and the five triremes which she furnished Herodotus and the Persian Wars the Persians were, next to the Sidonian, the most famous ships in the fleet. Adjoining these and in the same country dwell the people called Lyrkae; these also live by the chase, in such manner as I will show. The latest event alluded to in his History belongs tobut how soon after or where he died is not known. To him Pheretime came, asking him for an army which should bring her and her son back to Cyrene; but Evelthon being willing to give her all else, only not an army, when she took what he gave her she said that this was well, but it were better to give her an army at her request. Xerxes, upon the mention of money, turned to the Persians who stood by, and asked of them, "Who is this Pythius, and what wealth has he, that he should venture on such an offer as this? Now about this same time Theras who was a descendant of Polynices, through Thersander, Tisamenus, and Autesion was preparing to lead out colonists from Lacedaemon. I marvel what may have been the cause which compelled the lions to leave the other animals untouched and attack the camels, when they had never seen that beast before, nor had any experience of it. The Barcaeans answered that it was the deed of the whole city, for the many wrongs that Arcesilaus had done them; which when he heard, Aryandes then sent his armament with Pheretime. The kings guard this sacred gold most jealously, and every year offer to Herodotus and the Persian Wars solemn sacrifices of propitiation. The Ister, the greatest of all rivers known to us, flows with ever the same volume in summer and winter, it is the farthest westward of all the Scythian rivers, and the reason of its greatness is as follows: Many other rivers are its tributaries, but these are those that make it great, five flowing through the Scythian country: the river called by Scythians Porata and by Greeks Pyretus, and besides Herodotus and the Persian Wars the Tiarantus, the Ararus, the Naparis, and the Ordessus. For notwithstanding that it was open to him, with no trouble at all, to have had his ships drawn across the isthmus, yet he issued orders that a canal should be made through which the sea might flow, and that it should be of such a width as would allow of two triremes passing through it abreast with the oars in action. For instance, some of my bodyguard would be willing to engage singly with three Greeks. When Darius and the land army with him had come to the Ister, and all had crossed, he bade the Ionians break the bridge and follow him in his march across the mainland, together with the men of the fleet. Tell me, therefore, what thinkest thou? But as far as we have been able to hear an exact report of the farthest lands, all shall be set forth. For this mishap, Herodotus and the Persian Wars because they blamed Apries for it, the Egyptians revolted from him. Even in the later books on the attacks of the Persians against Greece there are digressions. The Phoenicians, with the Syrians of Palestine, furnished three hundred vessels, the crews of which were thus accounted: upon their heads they wore helmets made nearly in the Grecian manner; about their bodies they had breastplates of linen; they carried shields without rims; and were armed with javelins.
